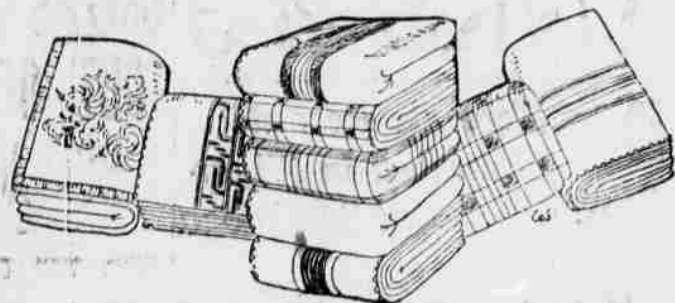

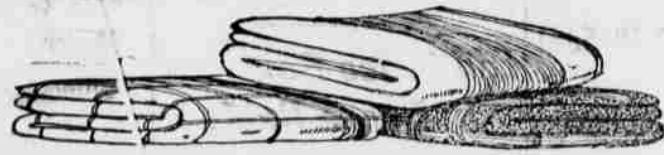

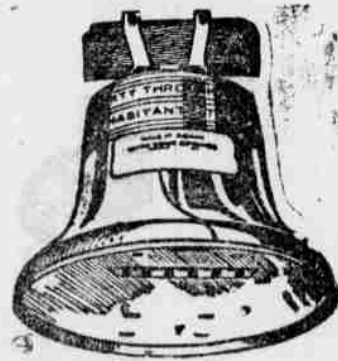
All of Sam's friends admitted he had a voice. Shortly after he had commenced driving for the cab company he began to take lessons, but was forced to discontinue them because they were so expensive. But he continued to sing.

Sam's cab was parked near the Union Station recently and Sam was waiting for a fare when one of his friends came up and told him a contest for musical scholarship was being held at Horner's. In a few minutes Sam was very nearly exceeding the speed limit in his haste to arrive at the institute.

Sam plunged into a room, which swarmed with people dressed in the height of fashion. Sam, attired in his cab uniform, cap, puttees and all, was the centre of attention for a time. Glances from each of the elegant assemblage were focussed upon him. The contestants continued to display their vocal abilities.
