Hogs Higher, Cattle Weak at Portland

(From The Oregon Journal.)

North Portland started after receipt records for the week's opening with a total of 124 cars, but this was below the big showing of a week ago. Hogs were strong to higher, cattle again showed depression while sheep and lamb trade conducted itself well.

Over Sunday arrivals in the cattle alleys totaled 2937 head as compared with the record run of 3285 head a week ago, but market conditions showed a poorer condition. While there was practically no snap to trading in the cattle division of the North Portland market last week, this week's opening indicated further sluggishness and depression with weakness permeating the entire trade.

Little early activity was shown in the cattle division of the North Portland market Monday and the limited first transactions were barely steady. It was impossible to interest buyers in general offerings at the opening, indicating a lower price to follow later in the day.

With a liberal decrease in the volume of marketing, the market for hogs started with real strength Monday morning. North Portland run over Sunday totaled 1161 head, compared with 3100 head a week ago when there was such a liberal showing of midwest hogs direct to killers.

Initial trading in the hog alleys was firm and strong with tops generally commanding an advance of 25 to 50¢ at \$11, but one load went a dime above this.

While the general position of the sheep and lamb trade started about steady for the Monday morning opening, yearlings were in an improved position generally. Only a very limited run was shown over Sunday, a fact which induced early bidding.

New Government Issue Commands Premium

NEW YORK, Oct. 10.—(A. P.)—Interest in yesterday's bond market centered on the government's \$200,000,000 new 4 1/2 per cent issue, which sold above par on the New York curb market, where it was traded in on a "when issued" basis. Early sales were at 100 1/2 and later the premium ranged from 1-3 to 1-4.

Total subscriptions for the new issue probably will reach \$1,500,000,000, according to officials of the local federal reserve bank. This estimate was based, in part, on an inquiry made among large New York institutions, which are expected to have subscribed for a major part of the offering.

Competition of the new bonds with existing government issues were reflected in the weakness of the liberty 4 1/2 series, the decline ranging from 19 to 24 points. The liberty 3 1/2-2 1/2 slipped back 8 points and the uncalled victory 4s. The called victories registered a net gain of 14 points.

Local traction issues were strong in reflection of the security holders' acceptance of the reorganization plan of the Interborough Rapid Transit company. Gains of 2 to 2 1/2 points were registered by New York Railway 4s, Interboro Rapid Transit 6s, Brooklyn Rapid Transit 4s and Third Avenue adjustment 5s moved up 1 to 1 1/2.

Foreign bonds were irregular. French 8s, Czechoslovakian 8s, Chinese government 5s and Lyons 6s, each moved up a point, while losses of 1 to 2 1/2 took place in Belgian 8s, United States Steamship of Copenhagen 8s and Cuba government 4 1/2-2s.

The outstanding gains in the domestic list were made by Gulf & Ship Island 5s, Southern Pacific 4s, Inevitable Oil 8s and Chicago and Northwestern 5s; up 1 1/2 to 3 1/2, while the principal weak spot was International & Great Northern 5s, off 1 1/2 points.

Total sales, par value, were \$14,029,000.

The principal offering today was the \$18,000,000 6 per cent issue of the Republic of Haiti, which was sold to the public at 96 1/2 to yield 6.25 per cent.

EAST VERSUS WEST FOR MUSEUM CHAMPIONSHIP

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Oct. 10.—(U. P.)—The war of the arts is on—East against West. The Widener collection of Pennsylvania and the Huntington collection of California are vying for the final championship, the world's title in art collections. With the recent acquisition of Rembrandt's famous masterpiece "The Descent from the Cross," the Widener museum offset the prestige won by Huntington, by his purchase of Gainsborough's "The Blue Boy" for \$800,000.

While the purchase price of "Descent from the Cross" has not been made public it is said to run considerably over the amount Widener paid for his last Rembrandt, rumored to have been \$500,000.

"The Descent from the Cross" is the flowering of the genius of the great Dutch master and marks the culmination of his efforts to interpret religious fever. Like other "old masters" it has had a long and varied history and for many years its authenticity was doubted. At last restored and reinstated to its rightful place in the art world it moved from owner to owner until it was sold at Christie's, London's famous auction room. This is the 13th Rembrandt Widener has added to his great art collection at Elk Hills Park, his beautiful estate near here. White Huntington has been building a magnificent museum out on his California estate. Widener has been quietly acquiring picture after picture. The winner in the contest will be the public, for it is said that both collections will eventually be left to the people. The city of Philadelphia has recently been enriched by the wonderful collection of English paintings, valued at more than \$1,400,000, left it by the late John H. McPhaden.
