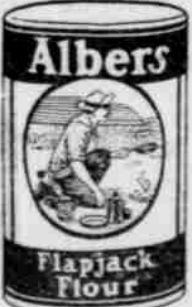

Wheat—The best prices of the day were made early in the session, but unlike recent days the advance was well maintained in face of rather general liquidation by holders in anticipation of further set back. The price of a reaction, nor did the general character of news give much basis for bullish ideas. There was again an excellent demand for cash wheat in all markets, with premiums on grades in such instances one to two cents higher relative to futures. Export trade continues hard to follow, and although only fair sales are reported from day to day, the fact exporters are finding it necessary to pay fancy premiums for wheat to fill old sales and are prevented from making further sales by their inability to secure grain than by lack of demand, is in itself a good and sufficient reason for expecting a strong market. Considerable portion of recent buying of futures is evidence to foreign interests, having contemplated purchases of cash grain. We look for prices to continue to display an advancing tendency.

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INVESTIGATION OF WAR

Former investigators of the department of justice, who delved deep into contract transactions and uncovered sensational evidence only to find that their work had seemingly been in vain, assert it was only after they had exhausted every effort to get action that congress was apprised of their findings. One of these investigators, H. L. Sealife, a lawyer of considerable note, worked six months repeatedly made reports and urged prosecution, and finally resigned in disgust after declaring his intention of going before congress.

He fulfilled his threat by laying his case before Congressmen Roy Woodruff of Michigan, and Congressman Royal C. Johnson of South Dakota, and then only was action got. Mr. Sealife is quoted in connection with his efforts in one phase of investigation having to do "with Mitsui & Co., Japanese financiers who operated in the United States under the names of the Standard Aircraft Corporation and the Standard Aero Company, to whom the government advanced \$16,416,580."

"Mitsui & Company are indirectly exercising powerful influence in this country which extends to congress and the department of government," Mr. Sealife says in an official report he made to Guy D. Goff, assistant to the attorney general, on March 18, 1932, after he had requested that his report be placed before the attorney general for transmission to the president.

When an investigation of the Standard Contracts began the law firm of Cadwalader, Wickersham & Taft notified the chief of finance of the air service that they had been retained by Mitsui & Company. A few days after this letter was written Abraham F. Myers was given general supervision of all air fraud cases. Shortly thereafter this young man notified the air service that no further information was to be given any person connected with the department of justice except through him. A few days later I established by conclusive evidence that the said Myers was placed in this key position through the influence of George W. Wickersham. Since that time the investigation of the air service had been blocked.

"Aside from the aggressive and open obstructions of Mr. Myers, I have reported to you the name of a high government official who is deeply involved and has been sufficiently powerful to seriously impede further investigation."

Both Mr. Sealife, and Marquis James, who wrote the American Legion series, put equal blame on both republican and democratic parties for the failure to prosecute and recover the hundreds of millions of taxpayers' money, and lay the cause to partisan politics. James ascribes democratic failure to act on the first report and first demand because of the nearness of election. He declares the word was sent "down the line" to deny everything, and to declare it all a republican trick. After the republicans came in to power, he says, they ceased the clamorous cries for prosecution, because of political obstructions within their own party.

"The case has continued the playing of politics, a topic for the type of political buncombe that is more apt to encourage skepticism than belief," he writes.

A review of what has been done toward punishing the guilty is given: "The \$40,000,000 to \$150,000,000, contracts of the United States Harness Company have been voided by the president for fraud. No indictments."

"A former motor transport captain has been convicted of accepting an \$800 bribe from agents of a skid-chain company and sentenced to two years in prison. He is at liberty on bail pending an appeal."

"Two sets of indictments have been voted—in the lumber and Old Hickory powder plant sales."

asserted against the Lincoln Motor Company, but no suit has been instituted.

Suit has been brought for recovery of 44,700 patents valued at millions of dollars sold by Frances P. Garvan, former Allen Property Custodian, for \$250,000 to the Chemical Foundation of which Mr. Garvan became president.

"So much and no more has been accomplished in the interest of the taxpayer, despite the character and volume of the evidence. Most of the foregoing is of recent date. By coincidence, or otherwise, the trial and conviction of the ex-captain, the announced determination to follow up the Lincoln action, the lumber and powder indictments and the patent suit have followed the sensational outburst in congress last April when the department of justice was arraigned for its delay, one republican member declaring he would move to impeach the attorney general unless prosecutions were forthcoming."

Following Sealife's resignation as an investigator W. O. Watts, the article says, who as a major was executive officer of the quartermaster corps, protested against the irregular disposal of property by which the government was losing millions, was discharged for protesting too much concerning them. He worked with the department of justice thereafter without pay, and served the Graham

committee in investigating frauds did not come as a species of natural phenomena. It was forced by public opinion, by public opinion informed and aroused principally by two government employees who sacrificed their jobs and by two members of congress who risked their political futures to do what they did.
