G. O. P. Sees Chance In The Southwest

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Oct. 28.—T. P. Strange, political boss of the Missouri state penitentiary, who now is president of the Hamilton Narcotic Institute, the institute, which has been attracting much attention in the West on account of several clinics which have been held, has only recently been organized.

In the clinic recently held at Portland five seasoned drug addicts were treated, and all five of them are said to have been cured. The treatment requires only 72 hours.

Another clinic probably will be held in California, and following this, Mr. Compton expects to go to New York. Several physicians of high standing are now connected with the institute. It is planned to sell state rights in administering the cure, Mr. Compton states. He will be here two or three days.

The situation developed when Earle B. Mayfield, supported by the Ku Klux Klan, was selected in the primary to succeed Senator Culbertson. Immediately the anti-Klan faction became active and in a fusion with republicans put up George E. R. Peddy, democrat, to run on a republican ticket as Mayfield's opponent. Henry Young further complicated matters by seeking admittance to the race as the "State's Rights" candidate.

Mayfield's name was first left off the ballot through an injunction order. Peddy's name was ordered from the ballot through a ruling of the attorney general that he was not nominated in the primary. Young sought a place on the ballot on the contention he represented a political party, but was overruled.

Regardless of the outcome of pending suits, indications were the situation would continue in litigation until after the election.

The split in Oklahoma politics followed the nomination of Jack Walton, mayor of Oklahoma City, for governor on the democratic ticket. James Pickett is the republican candidate. The entrance of the Farmer-Labor group broke party alignments in Oklahoma because Walton (nominated on the democratic ticket, insisted, in the state convention, that the liberals' platform be adopted for the campaign.

Supporters of Woodrow Wilson's wing of the democratic party in Missouri threaten to support the republican candidate as a slap at "Jim" Reed for opposing the former president's administration. Reed weathered the storm in the primary when he won the nomination, although Wilson took a hand with a personal appeal. The wine and beer issue has been injected into the campaign as a side attraction.

Local issues are being fought out on purely party lines in Kansas, although the industrial court law, fathered by Governor Henry Allen, is attracting attention. W. V. Morgan, republican candidate for governor, is supporting the measure, while labor, opposed to the court, is expected to line up behind Jonathan M. Davis, democrat.

NEW MEXICO SENATE BATTLE WAXES WARM

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., Oct. 28.—One of the closest votes in the history of New Mexico is predicted as a result of the hot political battle waged the last month between Senator A. A. Jones and Stephen S. Davis, Jr., for the United States Senatorial term, to be awarded at the general elections next week.

Although New Mexico has been considered in recent years to be "normally" republican, Senator Jones, the present incumbent, is a Democrat and is laying much stress in his campaign for re-election upon his seniority in the upper branch of Congress.

Davis, the Republican aspirant for Senatorial honors, resigned from the Supreme Court of the State to become a candidate against Jones.

The tariff law recently passed by a Republican Congress is the leading issue in the campaign, as New Mexico is vitally affected by the wool tariff.

Both Jones and Davis have conducted an extensive speaking campaign, and many speakers have come in from outside States to preach the gospel of the respective political parties.

A feature of the campaign over which the Democrats are highly elated is the fact that the Santa Fe New Mexico, one of the oldest Republican newspapers in the West, is favorable to Senator Jones' re-election.

The contest for New Mexico's only seat in the lower house of Congress, between Mrs. Adeline Otero-Warren, republican, and John W. Morrow, Democrat, has waxed warm, but not acrimonious. Mrs. Warren promises if elected to impress Congress with the necessity for turning over to the schools of New Mexico large grants of land, a task many New Mexican Congressmen have failed to accomplish in years of trying. Because of the great area of the state and its comparatively small population, the school financing problem has always been a difficult one for New Mexico.

A full State ticket will be elected at the elections Tuesday, in addition to the selection of a Congressman and United States Senator.

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
