The chief difference, according to makers and dealers in hosiery will be the absence of the seam down the back and along the foot. It was the modern prototype of the ballyhoose.

It fits snugly around the ankle, the foot and the leg, because there are fewer stitches in the ankle, more around the calf, and a graduated number in the foot just as there are in the hand knit woolen hose.
