NEW BRITISH PLANE
AERIAL 'DESTROYER'

LONDON, Nov. 1.—The battleship versus aircraft controversy will shortly become a back number if the new type of machine being constructed by the British Air Ministry is rated a success.

Known as the Cugaro, this machine is literally a winged naval destroyer. It is intended to be used, at the outset, for coastal defense purposes. Fitted with a very high powered engine, it will have a range, for either bombs or torpedoes, or over one thousand miles.

It is a three-seater machine and will be a most effective weapon, when operating in large numbers, in repelling not only invading aircraft but also aeroplanes and airships.

A Zeppelin would have no chance against it because a feature of the new design is its ability to climb at a tremendous rate. The cruising speed of the machine will be about three miles a minute.

Four machine guns will be fitted into the coastal defense plane. These are so arranged that there will be no "blind spot." There will be equal facility for firing in any direction.

BRING SWISS TO CULTIVATE MOUNTAINS

DENVER, Colo., Nov. 1.—(U. P.)—Plans are being perfected here for bringing to the mountainsides and valleys of the Rocky Mountain region, young Swiss dairymen to engage in cheese and butter making in this state and possibly in Wyoming and Utah.

Two colonies of at least 50 young industrious Swiss will be brought from Switzerland next spring and established.

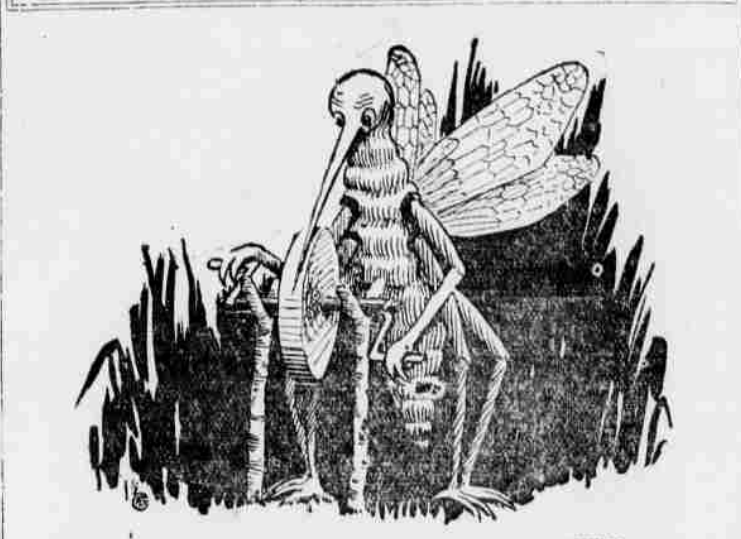
