MAYFIELD LEGALLY ON BALLOT IN TEXAS

DALLAS, Tex., Nov. 7.—(U. P.)—Earl B. Mayfield, democratic candidate for United States senator, backed by the Ku Klux Klan, is legally on the Texas ballot today as a result of an eleventh hour supreme court decision. His opponent is E. B. Peddy, independent democrat and anti-klan endorsed by the republican state committee.

PREDICTED LONG SKIRTS

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 7.—(U. P.)—Clara West, motion picture fashion designer, predicted fashion designer, predicted the failure of long skirts in America, but could not get a rise out of Pola Negri, famed Polish film actress, who sometimes wears them.

"Long skirts," said Miss West, "were designed by Continental modistes to hide the proverbially ugly ankles and legs of the European women. American women as a rule have nothing to hide, and they will not be hampered by the long skirt."

Pola Negri, however, would not be dragged into the argument.

"Nowhere," she said, "do women express their own individuality in dress as do the American women. If the individual American woman believes that a long skirt improves her appearance, she will wear it; if she personally favors a short skirt, she will wear that. She cares nothing for the fashions."

FAVOR BASEBALL UNION

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 7.—(U. P.)—Coast League ball magnates are not inclined to frown on the suggestion of a union of baseball players. While such a union is said to be in formation among big league players, and is causing eastern magnates sleepless nights, it isn't worrying the Coast league owners.

The players, it is said, will demand a place on the national commission. In order that the rights of the players may be more adequately protected. The change holding a player to a contract, but giving a club the right to break it on a few days' notice, will also be fought.

Coast League owners declare that, if the union comes, they will try to cooperate with it in every way. They do not believe such a union is necessary, particularly in minor league baseball, but will not, it is reported, put any obstacles in the way of its formation.

FIREWORKS KILLED TWO.

NOGALES, Ariz., Nov. 7.—(U. P.)—Explosion of a box of fireworks during a religious festival killed two persons and seriously injured five, according to advices from Guadalupe, capital of the state of Jalisco, Mex. The fireworks terminated the elaborate celebration of the anniversary of the "Virgin of Zapopan," and exploded as they were being carried through the throng. Narciso Sanchez, a man, and Composita Morales, a woman, were killed, while three young women and two men were seriously burned.

'GRUB-STAKING' ORGANIZATION FORMED

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Nov. 7.—An effort to stay the passing of the prospector, has been started by the new El Dorado has been started by the mining committee of the Salt Lake Commercial club and arrangements are being made for establishing a "grub-staking" organization, with a capital of \$500,000. The fund, which would be raised by popular subscription, would be used to finance trained and dependable prospectors in their hunt for minerals within the state. Members of the mining committee, according to their announcement, entered into the enterprise from a public spirited standpoint, only believing that Utah, which is the chief silver producing state in the Union, and which has yielded \$1,500,000,000 in mineral wealth, is capable of producing several times this total of its resources as carefully developed.

The name of the organization will probably be "The Prospecting Association of Utah" and one unit would be given to any person subscribing \$50 to the fund in ten monthly installments. Mining claims discovered would be shared according to the amount of stock held.

Governor Charles Mabey of Utah is among the many prominent citizens interested in the venture.

Prospecting, while not exactly a lost art, has become one in which few men are now active. Nowadays, it is almost impossible for a prospector to get a "grub stake," whereas in the mining boom days of Utah almost any business man, broker or mining operator would willingly put up the money.

MAKING TOUR OF COAST

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—Dr. E. W. Nelson, chief of the Biological Survey of the United States Department of Agriculture, is at present making a tour of inspection in several Pacific Coast states, during which he will discuss with state officials several subjects affecting both state and federal governments.

Washington state game officials will meet with Dr. Nelson at Seattle to discuss state campaigns being waged for the extermination of sea lions and seals along the coast, as they affect animals living on bird reservations under the jurisdiction of the Department of Agriculture.

Affairs of the Biological Survey in Alaska will be discussed by Dr. Nelson with E. P. Walker, chief fur warden of Alaska, who will meet him in Seattle.

Oregon state officials will confer with the survey chief regarding the settlement of a long standing controversy over the title of lands within the Malheur Lake bird reservation.

Dr. Nelson will also meet California state officials before returning to Washington.
