Fanning With Farrell

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—(U. P.)—Possibilities the boxing game provide for a willing worker and a good manager are well illustrated in the case of Willie Jackson, New York lightweight and until recently a prominent contender for Benny Leonard's title. Jackson's financial success in the ring was made public recently by Frank "Doc" Bagley, his former manager when the pair decided to sever a business relationship that had existed for eight years.

Back in 1914 Jackson was a sixteen-year old stripling, weighing ninety-eight pounds and working as an errand boy for the large sum of \$6 a week. Like Benny Leonard and many other prominent boxers, Jackson had a keen interest in the boxing game and he used to spend most of his spare time around the gymnasium and the old Fairmont Athletic Club, which was then the "garden" of New York.

Bagley was then handling a number of boxers and he saw more promise in the youngster and after some little training and tutoring he induced Jackson in a preliminary at the Fairmont, for which he received \$9. His development was slow but he was carefully handled and brought along by shrewd management until 1917 when he became a headliner by knocking out Johnny Dundee in two minutes and thirty-six seconds of a bout in Philadelphia.

Dundee had never been knocked out before and he never has since that time. Jackson naturally was hailed as a prospective champion and bouts for big purses came thick and fast.

In the last three years, Bagley claims Jackson earned \$250,000, of which \$120,000 was brought in in thirteen months.

He began slipping last winter and perhaps he is passed the stage where he can improve, but he is still a good card and his earning power has by no means been stopped.

Benny Leonard, Jack Britton, Joe Lynch and other prominent New York boxers have become wealthy in their business because of a large personal following of friends that pack the house every time they work.

Jackson, never popular, rushed in almost as much because the house was packed every time he showed with fans who came in the hope of seeing him get the worst off.

Both Bagley and Jackson knew of the feeling against him and instead of working to overcome it they shrewdly played it up so that he became one of the best drawing cards in New York.

How much of an attraction Jackson was is shown in the figures presented by Bagley that in eight bouts in Madison Square Garden, he and his opponents drew in excess of \$185,000. One bout with Dundee brought a gate of \$140,000 from 14,000 spectators at prices of \$1 to \$5. Another bout with Eddie Finschmann drew \$66,000 and a match with Rocky Kansas brought in \$88,000.

Bagley claims that their break was not caused by ill feeling and that they are still on good terms. Jackson wanted to make a trip to Australia and engage in some four-rounders in California and Bagley, having a big stake, could not afford the time, so he turned over a five year contract to Sammy Goldman, manager of Pete Herman, former lightweight champion.

Herman, by the way, is in bad shape in New York and is on the verge of total blindness. Several years ago a catarrh developed on one of his eyes but he gamely stuck to his business against the advice of doctors and the results were so serious that the doctors now fear that they will not be able to save his eyes.

Herman has done well. He has made a lot of money and has invested it wisely, according to his friends, so that if he is forced to give up boxing his wife and two little girls will not be in need.

His wife insists that he shall retire from the ring if he does recover, but little Pete has an idea that he can win the bantamweight again and make a record of having won a championship three times.

U. S. TRACTORS POPULAR

FORMER POSTMASTERS-GENERAL STILL GET MAIL AT WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.—Although the Post Office Department does not receive mail addressed to Benjamin Franklin, the first Postmaster-General, it does frequently receive mislabeled letters for Postmasters-General who long since left office, according to officials. Several letters were received by the Department recently addressed to "Postmaster-General Walter Q. Gresham," who headed the postal system of the United States way back in 1883, under President Arthur, and who has been dead a number of years.

An average of ten letters a day are received addressed to Will Hays, former Postmaster-General. Other department mails come now and then to "Postmaster-General Burleson," who served under President Wilson, and also to "Postmaster-General Hitchcock," who was in President Taft's Cabinet.

RIVOLI TODAY

Anita Stewart in her latest Associated First National picture, "Sowing the Wind," will be the feature attraction at the Rivoli Theatre beginning today. Louis B.
