## RAILROAD BUSINESS IS GOOD IN ALASKA

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, Nov. 13.—Uncle Sam is finding the railroad business good on his new Alaska line which runs from Fairbanks to Anchorage, across the mountains to Fairbanks and Nenana on the territory's interior river system.

Traffic has been so heavy on the line that it has been necessary to add more Pullman sleeping coaches and baggage cars. At present the road is operating thirty passenger coaches, 716 freight cars and 235 cars of miscellaneous nature, making a total of 1,027 cars.

In addition to the railroad, the government is operating two river transports to connect the lower river points with the road. These boats will connect with mosquito fleets operating on the smaller rivers of the interior and will serve to hook up the entire section in one great transportation system.

Coal is one of the big items on the freight bills on this transportation system. The coal is taken from the mines along the railroad and sent to all parts of the interior by rail and boat.

With a good supply of coal at reasonable prices it will be possible to mine large areas of frozen ground which, it is believed, contain considerable quantities of gold. \$200,000,000 in gold in these gravels.

None, one of the abundant points of Alaska, will benefit by getting coal at lower prices. At present coal is \$45 a ton in Nome. By taking it down the river and across an arm of the Bering Sea to Nome it is thought coal can be sold there for half the price.
