Rev. Clark Is Speaker.
Rev. George L. Clark, pastor of the Presbyterian church, was the speaker of the day at Pilot Rock's Armistice Day celebration Saturday. One of the features of the celebration was the holding of a large American flag which the citizens of Pilot Rock purchased, and which will fly from a new flagpole. Joseph S. Scott, county chairman for the Red Cross Roll Call, accompanied Rev. Clark. Rev. Clark is Unatilla county chairman and the two did some work in the interests of the campaign, which opened Saturday.

To Run Down Runner.
Carl and Hugh Kirkpatrick, brothers of Jean Kirkpatrick, formerly editor and publisher of the Pilot Rock Record, who mysteriously disappeared from Pendleton about the middle of August and has not been heard from since, made a trip to Walla Walla yesterday. "We had information that several people in Walla Walla have made claims that they know where my brother is now," Hugh Kirkpatrick said this morning. "We did not conclude our work, but we expect to follow the clues we have until we either find my brother or find that the clues are false."

Game Violators Fined.
Three hunters have been fined in the court of Justice Joe H. Parkes within the past few days. A. D. Kern, a Portland man, was fined \$25 and costs on a charge of hunting on the Unatilla County Game Preserve. John Doe received a like fine on a charge of game law violations. Andrew Milleson was fined \$25 and costs for hunting without a gun license. He had his hunting license, but he is a foreigner and the law requires that in such case the sportsman must have a gun license in addition to the regular hunting license. In addition to his fine, Milleson paid another \$25 for a gun license.

Case Is Postponed.
The case of Conates against Shushier, originally set for trial today, was not heard in circuit court and has been postponed until the January term, according to a statement made by Judge Gilbert W. Phelps today. Depositions taken in the case were lost, according to attorneys, and an extension of time was requested to have the depositions taken again. The libel case of Taylor against Kuck, also set for this week, was postponed by the court after the other case proved to be not ready for trial. Judge Phelps declared that he did not wish to call the trial jury for the trial of one case. Both cases probably will be tried in the January term of court.

Start Forming Budget.
Some good headaches are in course of being contracted in the offices of the county court, starting today. There's nothing illegal about the cause of the headaches. They are merely a part of the job of making a county budget. The three members of the court, together with J. O. Hales, new commissioner-elect, are already starting their preliminary grind. On Wednesday the court will be joined by J. H. Sturgis, Carl McNaught and A. C. McIntyre the three appointive members of the budget committee, and the business of perfecting the budget will then be pushed. One of the problems this year to be met is the fact the assessed valuation of the county is \$2,000,000 less than it was last year.

MANY ARTISTS WILL APPEAR IN PROGRAM

CHICAGO, Nov. 13.—(A. P.)—Chicago's Civic Opera Company, backed by 2200 guarantors who have pledged financial aid for the next five years, will make its how tomorrow night, opening the regular ten week's season.

Roma Raima will sing Aida, supported by Giulio Crimi, Ima Bourcay, Cesare Formichi, Virgilio Lazari and Edouard Cotreuil with Mestro Giorgio Polacco at the conductor's desk.

The new company succeeds the old Chicago Grand Opera association, which was principally supported by Harold P. McCormick and Mrs. Edith Rockefeller McCormick.

Mary Garden, general director last year, will make her first appearance of the season Tuesday night in Carmen, supported by Georges Baklanoff.

The season's repertoire, as planned includes eighteen operas sung in Italian, one in English, six in French and five in German.

Among the Chicago debuts will be

Revivals which have not been heard here for several seasons will include Victor Herbert's "Natoma" (in English); Wagner's "Parsifal" and "The Valkyrie"; Humperdinck's "Koenigsrunder" and "Hansel and Gretel"; Von Flotow's "Martha" and Giordano's "Andrea Chenier."

The artists for the season include most of the old favorites of the former Chicago company, and a large list of newcomers, including Feodor Chaliapin, the famous Russian basso and Grace Hult, a Danish soprano who has never been heard in this country. Besides Miss Garden and Haiss, the mezzo-soprano and con-

traalto list includes Edith Mason, Cyrena Van Gordon, Maria Claessens and several others who have sung here in the past. Tito Schipa, Forrest Lamont and Octabe Duna again head the list of tenors, while the baritones include, besides Baklanoff, Joseph Schwarz, Giacomo Rimini, Defrere, Formichi and Milo Luka, a newcomer. Chaliapin, Dazari and Cotreuil will be the principal basses.

Mestro Polacco will be assisted by Pietro Cimini, one of last year's conductors, and Richard Hageman, a new addition.
