It was the gift of Dr. Henry Waldo Coe, who presented it to the city of Portland. The clothes and equipment worn by Roosevelt in the battle of San Juan hill are reproduced in the statue.

FARMERS' SHORT COURSE OFFERS MANY SUBJECTS

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Nov. 13.—Seven short courses in practical farming are offered Oregon farmers this winter by the agricultural college as follows:

Eleven weeks in tractor mechanics, Jan. 2-March 17.

Eleven weeks in general agriculture, same date.

Eleven weeks in horticulture, same date.

Five months as dairy herdsman, Jan. 2-June 10.

Four weeks in dairy manufacture, Jan. 2-27, repeated Jan. 28-Feb. 24.

Short course in horticultural products—canning, drying, jellies, etc., Feb. 6-24.

One week in beekeeping, March 13-24.

The work deals with methods of growing leading crops, handling the livestock, learning to run a tractor and care for it, handling the orchard, garden, berry patch and flower garden, managing dairy animals, butter cheese and ice-cream making, managing bees, and converting fresh fruit and vegetables into conserved products.

The courses are explained in a small pamphlet free to those interested. Write O. A. C., Corvallis, Oregon.

failed to incorporate their real estate firm on the ground that their naturalization was illegal. The question turned largely upon whether section 1699 of the revised statutes restricting naturalization to "free white persons" and those of African descent was still in force.

The supreme court in its decision said in part: "Federal and state courts in an almost unbroken line, have held that the words 'white person' were meant to indicate only a person of what is popularly known as the Caucasian race. With the conclusion reached in these several decisions we see no decision to differ. Moreover, that conclusion has become so well established by judicial and executive concurrence and legislative acquiescence that we should not at this late day feel at liberty to disturb it, in absence of reason far more cogent than any that have been suggested."

U. S. IS AFTER TAXES ON THE BOOZE GRAFT

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—Tax-evasion bootleggers, who have amassed wealth selling illicit booze, are being rounded up in one of the most persistent drives ever begun by the Internal Revenue Bureau. The Government is shying many millions of dollars in revenue because bootleggers have failed to make returns showing their income.

A new system devised by the Bureau has put the Government on the tracks of tax dodgers of this class. The "Big Fours" and other similarly designated cliques that have a monopoly on the booze supply and distribution in the larger cities, are being caught rapidly through information supplied by prohibition agents.

In one large city discovery was made that the chief of police, city councilmen and other dignitaries were active members of the booze combination. Examination of their bank accounts disclosed fabulous sums accumulated suddenly from liquor profits. Investigation shows that in practically every case these taxpayers failed to account for their income from liquor sources.

Records seized by prohibition agents all over the country have led to sensational disclosures involving high officials. They are actively participating in the profits on big deals. In many cities, prohibition officials declared, local officials count upon a

certain stipulated rake off on all liquor transactions.

One of the so-called kings of bootleggers, who made a phenomenal rise as a financier, has been discovered with a possible indebtedness to the Government so large that almost his entire fortune may be wiped out if the government collects all of the penalties and taxes assessed against him. In this case his liability has been multiplied many times through the past two years by failure to report his true income, for falsifying his tax statement, and withholding taxes on liquor made and sold.

In its pursuit of the tax evaders in bootleg ranks the Internal Revenue Bureau is slapping on the maximum penalties. These are very severe.

FIRE SWEEPS ARMY POST.

MOUNT CLEMENS, Mich., Nov. 13.—Hangars and barrack buildings at Selfridge field, the army aviation post near here, were threatened with destruction by fire last night. The fire originated in the quarter-master building near the hangars, which stretch for more than a mile around the field, and was soon beyond control of the Mount Clemens fire department. A call for aid was sent to Detroit and all apparatus that could be spared from that city was ordered to the field.

AUTOIST NAPS IN WRECK.

MUSKOGON, Mich., Nov. 13.—Herman Havena is a sound sleeper. His automobile plunged down an embankment early today and stopped on its side in a deep ditch. When Sheriff Mathews arrived he found Havena sleeping in the car and had to hoist him out through the door. He was charged with driving while intoxicated. "I couldn't get out, so I went to sleep," explained Havena.
