KEMAL TO MAKE TURK
CAPITAL DRY AS DUST

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 12.—Thrills raised East of Suez are going to be unshakable, so far as Constantinople is concerned, once Mustafa Kemal takes over the city.

Kemal has made all Anatolia as dry as the Helaz desert and declares he will do the same for the Turkish capital. It will take considerable drying up to check the moisture of Constantinople, for the per capita consumption of hard liquor in the European quarter of Pera is about the same as it used to be in the old First Ward in Chicago.

Douzo Powerful
Douzo, a slow and poisonous drink that hits you with the awkwardness and wallop of Battling Siki and is so powerful that it is never taken without a handful of crackers spread with caviar or sour cheese as a decoy for it to

work on instead of the lining of the stomach, is the principal beverage. It is made on the spot from raw U. S. alcohol imported from the States in great steel drums.

No man can drink douzo long and survive. This is proved by the countless cemeteries that sprout over all the bare Constantinople hillsides.

When the Germans were the dominant influence at the Sublime Porte they introduced beer to the followers of the Prophet, and now one of the biggest breweries in the world is in the city on the Golden Horn. Beer has been the most lasting vestige of the German regime, and a stone no larger than a man's hand thrown at random in any direction in Taksim square would be sure to hit at least three good Mohammedans lingering there, prayer beads with one hand and a twelve-inch stein of Pilsener with the other. The Koran forbids the consumption of alcohol—but the Koran was written before the Germans introduced beer to Constantinople. The Turk's view probably is that Mohammed might have revised his copy if he had ever tasted Pilsener.

Despite Kemal's closing of all the cafes and domino parlors of Anatolia and his ban on the cup that cheers his intimates, Mustafa himself likes his liquor. This may or may not be, but an American business man who went to Kemal's headquarters in Smyrna to protect United States tobacco interests, taking luggage principally composed of a dozen bottles of cognac and the same number of Scotch, became, after the drawing of the initial cork, the most popular non-Mohammedan this side of Gibraltar.

The American tobacco was saved. But the cognac and the Scotch weren't. Kemal declares, though, that he is going to dry up the town, and the fear that he will make good his threat makes every night in Constantinople a small-scale reproduction of New Year's Eve on Broadway in the old days. Constantinople is on its last leg, and it is a large-scale jug, with no drinks mixed and with "We who are about to buy salute you!" the battle cry.

SENATE CHOICE MADE.

KNOXVILLE, Tenn., Nov. 12.—Governor Taylor tonight announced whom he will appoint in the event President Harding names Senator John K. Shields to the supreme court bench as Justice Day's successor.

Guy L. Smith, editor, owner of the Johnson City Chronicle and graduate of Princeton, the governor's alma mater, is to receive the toga. Governor Taylor would set at rest rumors that he intended to name Newell Saunders, Chattanooga millionaire, overwhimingly defeated by Senator McKellar last Tuesday.

Names of Mrs. L. C. French, democrat, and Miss Mary Boyce Hemple of Knoxville have been prominently mentioned for the appointment.
