SIX HUNDRED PLAN TO ATTEND BIG MEETING

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Nov. 13.—Six hundred delegates representing local chapters in every state of the Union have indicated their intention of attending the twenty-ninth convention of the United Daughters of the Confederacy, to be held here November 14-18, according to Mrs. Chappell Cory and Mrs. S. L. Ledbetter, general chairmen in charge of arrangements.

On the opening day, responses to welcoming addresses will be made by Miss Debra Leann West, Waco, Texas, following which will occur the presentation of the president-general, Mrs. Livingston Rowe Schuyler of New York City, by Mrs. Charles B. Bryan, Memphis, Tenn. The day's program also calls for an address by John Tilly, of Harvard University, and presentation of a portrait of Jefferson Davis.

A reception in honor of the president-general, other general officers and delegates will be tendered Wednesday evening, Nov. 15. Election of officers will take place Thursday, Nov. 16.

The delegates will visit in a body the state capital at Montgomery, Friday, Nov. 17, where a session of the convention will be held in the senate chamber. The annual ball will be held in the evening at Birmingham.

New officers will be presented on the final day of the convention. General officers of the Confederacy include: Mrs. Livingston Rowe Schuyler, N. Y., President-General; Mrs. Frank Harold, Americus, Ga., 1st Vice-President-General; Mrs. Bennett D. Bell, Nashville, Tenn., 2d Vice-President-General; Mrs. R. D. Wright, Newberry, S. C., Recording Secretary-General; Miss Allie Garner, Ozark, Ala., Secy-General; Mrs. Amos H. Morris, Tampa, Fla., Treasurer-General; Mrs. F. M. Williams, Newton, S. C., Rear-Treasurer-General; Mrs. A. C. Campbell, Wytheville, Va., Historian-General; Mrs. W. D. Mason, Philadelphia, Pa., Custodian of Crosses at Honor; Mrs. J. H. Gresham, Mount Vernon, Ala., Custodian of Flags and Pennants; and Honorary President-General in Memoriam, Mrs. Jefferson Davis.
