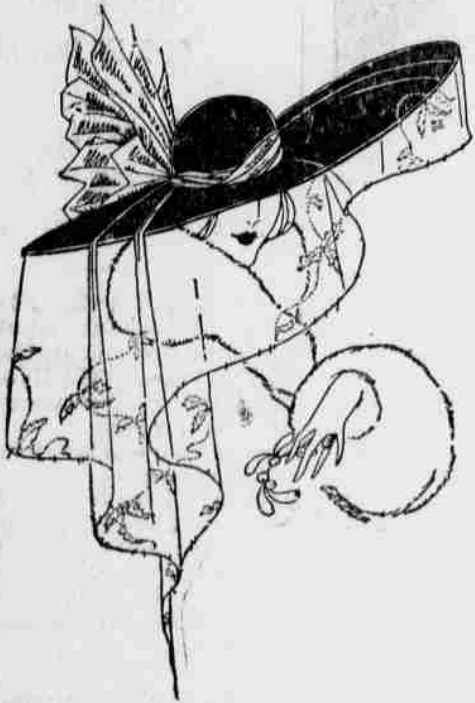

LONDON, Dec. 1.—(I. N. S.)—King George of Greece is held a virtual prisoner in the palace at Athens after being refused permission to leave the country. The palace is

JAPANESE LABORERS FAIL TO AGREE ON FEDERATION TERMS

Socialists Break up Attempt to Unite Various Local Unions Into National Group.

OSAKA, Japan, Dec. 1.—(A. P.)—An attempt to form a federation of the labor unions of Japan has ended in failure, owing to the inactivity of the socialists, who are in control of some of the unions, to agree with the regular unionists, who avoid politics. A conference called here for October 1 ended in a row in which the police took a hand, eventually arresting a number of the socialists.

The Nippon Rodo Sodomei, the socialist wing, wanted a federation with central control while their opponents, the Kumai Sodomei, wanted local autonomy. On the discussion of the rival resolutions an outcry arose, which threatened to develop into a free fight when the police intervened and were made the targets of bottles and stones, but soon got the upper hand, cleared the hall and took the ringleaders to jail, whence they later were released.

However this fight between the two elements in the labor movement is said to be only one reason for the failure of the laborers to advance their cause. There has been in Japan for a great number of years an organization known as the Kokusai-kai, which in some respects might be likened to the Pactist of Italy. This society, which avails great power, is opposed to all revolutionary movements and is in the habit of taking "direct" action when called upon. It is backed by the great labor contractors, who supply labor in the bulk throughout the country. When a strike is called in a given industry, this organization often is asked to intervene in the interests of the prevailing order of things and usually it can induce the workers, by one means or another to return to work. It is strongly opposed to labor unions and uses its influence to prevent them from gaining membership.

At a meeting of the Nippon Rodo Sodomei, after the failure to form a Federation, a protest was entered against "the outrages committed by the members of the Kokusai-kai upon members of the Sodomei" at a recent meeting held at Kyoto.

Another cause of the lack of strength of the unions at the present time is the business depression, many skilled workmen, especially those in the engineering trade, at present being out of work.

DINING CAR PATRONS CONSUME MUCH FOOD

CHICAGO, Dec. 1.—(A. P.)—Approximately 2,000,000 eggs, 1,500,000 pounds of fresh meat, 1,500,000 pounds of potatoes, 500,000 pounds of sugar, 5,000,000 rolls, 150,000 pounds of coffee and 500,000 quarts of milk and cream are consumed yearly by the Pennsylvania railroad dining car patrons, according to the Pennsylvania News, publication of that railroad.

The railroad's dining-car service, serving 10,000 meals daily, if operated unprofitably, could serve 4,236 persons at one sitting. The 125 cars in the service, if placed end to end, would form a mobile restaurant approximately two miles long.

A force of about 1,555 employees is required to prepare and serve the 5,572,000 meals which railroad waiters annually carry down the aisles of diners traveling forty and fifty miles an hour.

The meals are prepared in distinctive kitchens having four cooks, a chef and three assistants. Each car represents an investment of \$30,000 of which \$3,000 is spent for silverware, utensils and linen.

TOKIO, Dec. 1.—(A. P.)—A method of transporting live fish long distances has been discovered by Dr. Chiyo-matsu Ishikawa, professor of the Tokyo Imperial University, by infusing a quantity of oxygen in the water of boxes doubly lined with zinc in order to prevent leakage. The method proved successful and will be again tried with "ayu" a kind of trout which it hitherto has been believed impossible to transport alive. It is very important for the Japanese people to obtain fresh fish, one of the national dishes being raw fish.

RUSS INSANE ASYLUM IS FULL OF CANIBALS

LONDON, Dec. 1.—An insane asylum, the inmates of which are all convicted cannibals, is one of the after-famine sights seen by J. Bentley Mulford, of Washington, D. C., on a recent trip to Samara.

Mulford, who was an official of the American Relief Administration Medical Department in Moscow, has said for home after five months' service in Russia.

"The results of the famine are still apparent everywhere," he said, "in the crowded orphan homes where we are now feeding, in the hospitals full of patients suffering from intestinal and other troubles as a result of eating grass and clay, in the refugees—and in such sights as the insane asylum."

It reminded him, Mulford said, of nothing so much as the Zoo. The patients who are not violent now are allowed to roam at will in an enclosed yard near the house, and in their facial expression, aimless action and fishlike appearance they are exactly like animals. Their number was about twelve, and they are all suffering from a disease diagnosed by Dr. Fowcar, the A. R. A. medical supervisor at Samara, as cachexia.

All such institutions, as well as hospitals, are now stocked with a month's supply of medical necessities from the A. R. A. stores, Mulford said, including everything from blankets to hypodermic needles and cod liver oil, which the A. R. A. measures by the ton.

During his stay, Mulford said, he noticed an enormous improvement in Moscow, but while on the surface the city was almost normal the suffering was still acute in the homes, due partly to lack of food, but more still to present lack of fuel and clothing.

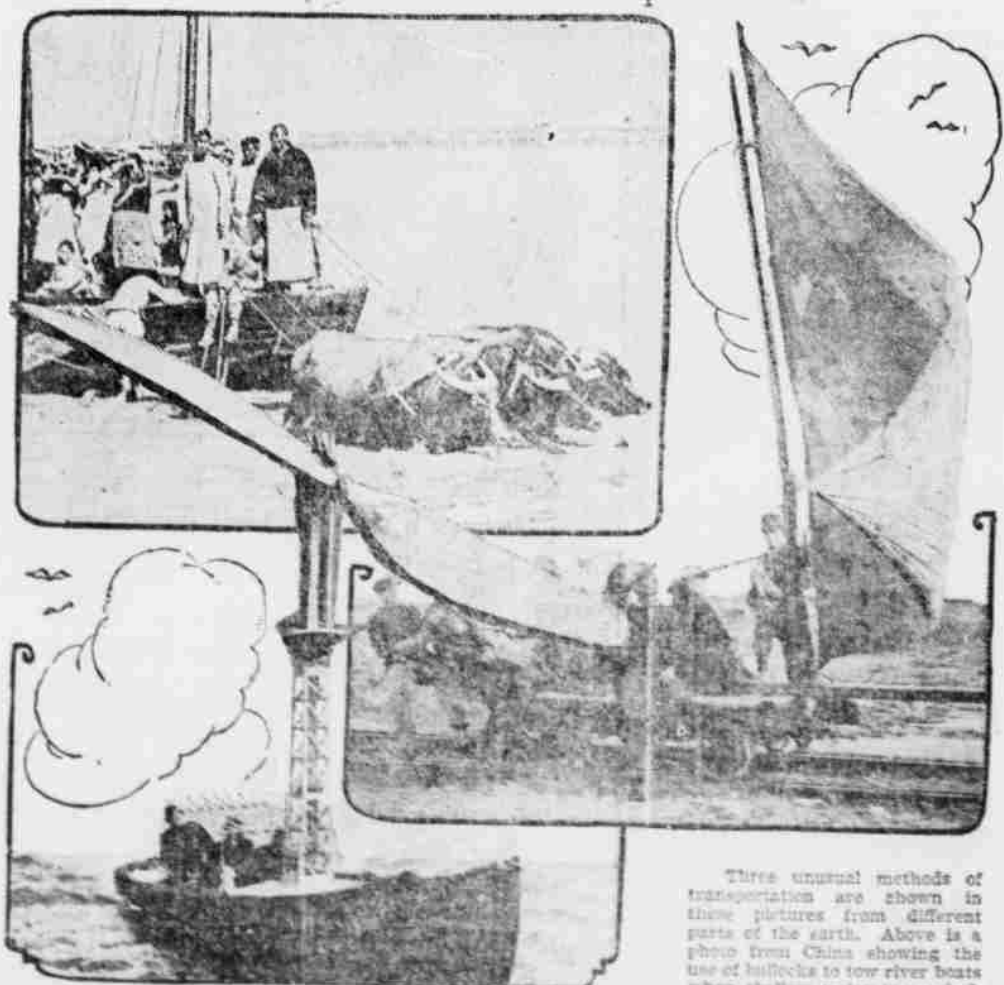

Some Varieties in Transportation



Three unusual methods of transportation are shown in these pictures from different parts of the earth. Above is a photo from China showing the use of balloons to tow river boats when shallow water is reached. British soldiers (right) have devised a novel train to carry them safely from Kilmessy to Kilmessy, England. A sail, attached to a hand-car, provides the power. Partisans have recently been started by the "Buis Rose," a Seine boat which, without sail or motor, travels speedily by means of this propeller wherever a fair breeze is blowing.
