leaked out here, and which has been confirmed by Head Coach "Chick" Meahan, of the Orange gridiron forces. It's a story of pluck from the ground up and of nerve.

Really Weighs 145.
Culver's weight has been given out consistently as 165 pounds during the last season. That's five pounds more than it was listed at during 1921.

But the truth of the matter is that Culver at no time has tipped the beam at 145 pounds.

And yet he's All-American timber in spite of the handicap.

Culver came to Syracuse from Toledo, where he was a sensational prep school center. His light weight kept him off the 1920 Orange team. In 1921 Culver reported, looking little changed so far as weight was concerned. He seemed doomed to the scrub.

Culver did a little quick thinking and then consulted the assistant manager, who was in charge of weighing in. The net result was that when Culver stepped on the scales nightly the weight chart showed 160 to 162 for Culver. If it hadn't that assistant manager would have received a fine little wallop.

The "added weight" told, and Culver got his chance. Then came the Pitt game, and Meahan did some close personal weighing. He dis-

covered Culver's trick, and the Orange center pleaded guilty, but begged for a chance to face Stein of Pitt. He did, and his showing kept him, at center. Then, at the close of the season, some his election as captain for this year.

But not until he turned in his toes after the Colgate game this fall did the boys on the squad know that Syracuse was playing a center who weighed only 145.

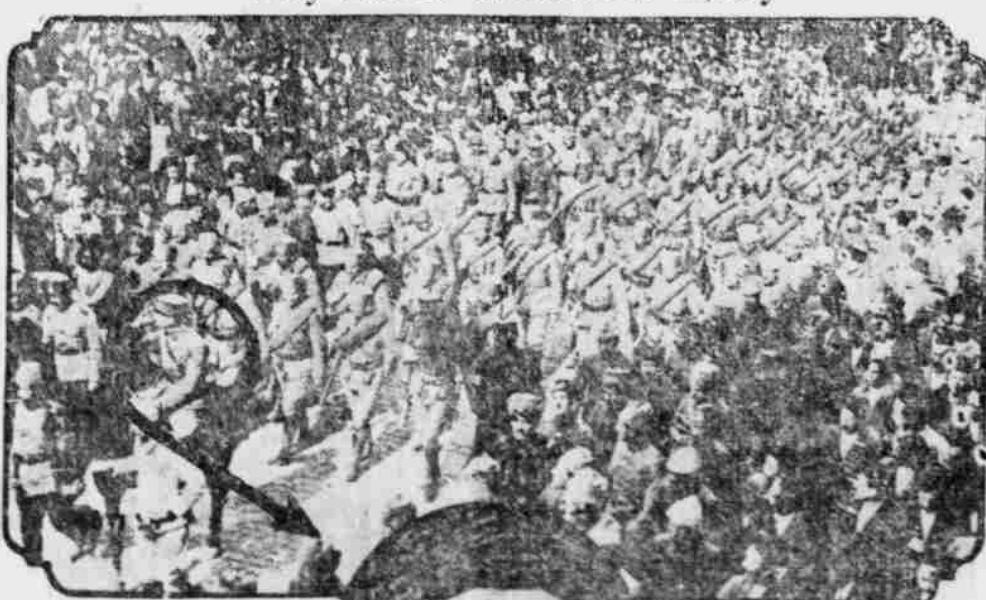
ALBANY, Ga., Dec. 6.—(U. N. S.)—Three years ago J. M. Bundrick, Albany "toll" for a hard luck story.

BOTH AMERICAS ARE HUNTED FOR RELICS FOR NEW FOUNDATION

Museum Seeks Answer to Question, 'Whence Came the American Indian?'

NEW YORK, Dec. 6.—(U. N. S.)—Riches of the Aztecs such as were in the loot of Cortez; ornaments of fine gold such as Pizarro, the Spanish conqueror, took from the Peruvians; priceless objects of art of the civilization of ancient Mexico, are about the ready two million specimens of the Museum of American Indian, Heye Foundation, which today was officially opened. Tomorrow it will be ready for the public, who without charge will have the opportunity to see and study the most remarkable assemblage of the records of the past of the two Americas now under one roof. Among those invited to the reception were distinguished citizens and scholars from all parts of the country.

Lineage Sought.
One of the main purposes of the new museum is to bring to the final answer to the question: "Whence came the American Indian?" Are they the Ten Lost Tribes, blood brothers to the Japanese, or Chinese, or did they flow from a sinking continent? Scholars and scientists, by the comparison of hundreds of thousands of specimens, may be able to work out that puzzling problem. At the same time designers of costumes, makers of fabrics, manufacturers of pottery may find inspiration in these remarkable collections for practical purposes. The general public will gain education and recreation and food for romance.

Although this museum, situated at Broadway and One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, is a massive building, it can show at one time only about one-fifth of its treasures. The contents of many of the cases therefore, will be changed from time to time. Under some of the flat cases are nests of drawers, which visitors can pull out with their own hands and inspect specimens not on view.

The guests today were impressed with the wide difference in the culture or civilizations of the first Americans. As explained by the director and founder of the museum, George G. Heye, the highest development in the class of that of the early Greeks, was south of the Rio Grande, while in the northern countries the natives lived in the primitive style. Such variations can be especially well studied in this institution, the only one in the world dedicated to the American Indian, although there are notable collections of Indian relics in other large museums.

Rich Treasures.
Among its treasures is a relic of the Mayas, the oldest race in the Americas, a sacred vessel used in the worship of the sun.

Mexico is represented by numerous beautiful objects of Aztec craftsmanship. Among them is the finest example of Aztec turquoise mosaic in the world, so far as is known. It is a shield only one foot in diameter and ornamented with 14,000 bits of turquoise, arranged in a design which illustrates the worship of the planet Venus. The colors vary from light green to a dark blue green and are exquisitely blended.

Massive seats of stone, shaped like classic chairs, reveal the art of natives of Ecuador, who passed from this life many centuries ago. Among the picturesque objects in the Ecuadorian collection are human heads, reduced to about one-fifth of their natural size and preserved so that there has evidently not been the slightest change in their features. Here, also, is an entire human body only twenty-seven inches long, although it was once that of a full-grown man. The skeleton and skull were removed, after which the flesh was preserved by a pickling process. The shrinking was done by putting hot sand and stones into the body after day after day. Although the heads are frequently seen this is the only entire shrunken body known. The Jivaro Indians, who practice this strange skill, so keep the heads of enemies slain in battle.

A canoe paddle, such as is described in the record of the voyage of Columbus, and dishes of wood hundreds of years old, represent the West Indies. Central America has contributed ancient jewelry and ornaments of solid

gold of wonderful workmanship.

Legends and the poetry of the Northern Indians are revealed in the collections of costumes and masks. Ecstasies of the False Face Brethren, made at the famed command of spirits, and the sacred bundles and fetiches are included, which illustrate the superstitions of the early inhabitants.

Ancient Cards Shown.

Festivals of the aborigines are recalled by racy garments, the bright head-dresses and weird musical instruments. Enormous dishes, as large as modern bathtubs, in which the Indians of British Columbia put the food for their guests, when they held their potlaches, recall the carnyvals at which were welcomed old friends and neighbors.

One can only suggest, however, the wealth of material for research and for recreation found in the new institution.

The museum of the American Indian, Heye Foundation, grew out of the enthusiastic interest in aboriginal culture aroused in George G. Heye in 1927, when engaged in the construction of a railroad in Arizona. His first contact with Indian lore was through the purchase of a buckskin shirt from an Indian workman. The son of Gustav Heye, an official of the Standard Oil Company, Mr. Heye became interested in large business affairs upon his return to the East, but for years collected Indian objects as a diversion. He finally withdrew from the financial world to devote himself entirely to the museum, of which he is both founder and director.

NEW YORK, Dec. 6.—(U. N. S.)—Coney Island aims to surpass Atlantic City as a great fat-year-round resort. The great boardwalk which has been under construction for over a year will be completed early in 1923. The concrete work has been practically completed.

With the opening of the boardwalk through the entire length, millions will probably be expended for new buildings and the resort will be vastly altered.
