CUBAN WOMEN WANT SUFFRAGE FOR WOMEN

HAVANA, Cuba, Dec. 7.—(A. P.)—Removal of one word "males" from the Cuban constitution is all that The National Suffragist Party asks of congress.
 Stating it has waited until after the elections of November to make its request, the organization has addressed a petition to President Zayas, asking him to include in his first message to the new congress a recommendation that the offending word be blotted out by constitutional amendment. Such action would admit women to the polls.
 At the one special and two regular sessions of congress held since President Zayas took office in May of 1921, the equal suffrage issue has been successfully dodged.

REFORMERS OPPOSE CAFES
 LONDON, Dec. 8.—(A. P.)—London clearly is getting back to the bright night life of before the war, for there is an enormous rush just now to secure licenses for night clubs, music and dance halls, and other resorts where the light hearted were wont to frequent in the old days.
 But the churches and the welfare organizations are protesting. They urge that London has lived for seven years without such establishments, and that it is not necessary for them to be reopened now.
