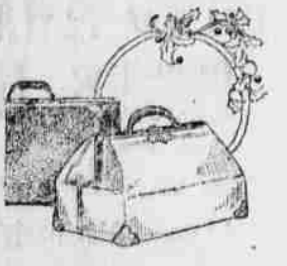

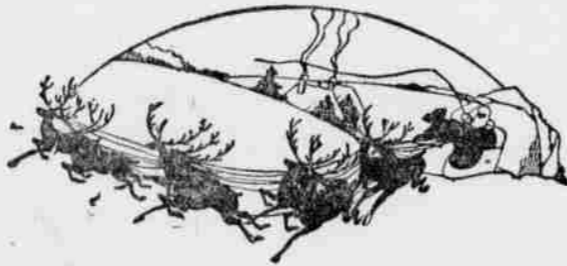

## NEW GOWNS LOOK LIKE COAT OF MAIL

PARIS, Dec. 12.—(I. N. S.)—There is much of the coat-of-mail appearance about the gowns made of some of the unusual new fabrics.

The Dolly Sisters started the ball rolling in Deauville by wearing bodices and slightly full skirts of a new kind of leather made up for them. It is a twin sister to aluminum but as supple as velvet, and it neither cracks nor breaks.

Curious bodices without any decoration are made of this new fabric, with which are worn fancy belts of great width.

Aluminum-colored leather is being used to make jumper jackets for cold days and motorings. It is metallic-looking but without the hardness of metal. Bits of it trim many garments, producing the coat-of-arms effect. On many others are small ruby glass rounds and burnished metal discs like mirrors.

A sensational and amusing variety of this fabric is called "the Night Club," presenting a series of dancing women in scanty attire and men, young and old, looking on. Whole gowns cannot be made of it, but doubtless there will be many a corsetage.

## JAPAN APPROVES OF CITY PLANNING SYSTEM

INDIANAPOLIS, Dec. 12.—(I. N. ## WORLD WAR AGAINST OPIUM EVIL URGED

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 12.—Initial steps toward an international war on the illicit drug industry, particularly opium, have been taken by Mrs. Angelle Kaufman, known locally as the "angel of the county jail," who has sent a letter to President Harding asking that he use his best offices for an international agreement for the control of drug distribution.

Mrs. Kaufman took this step as a result of the efforts now being made by President Hu-Thu-Chang of China to stop the opium evil in his native country. To this end the Chinese President is said to have appointed a large committee, including military and civil authorities and a member of the International Anti-Opium Society. This committee has as its chief members of all educational, missionary and anti-vice societies in China.

**Wants World Pact**  
In her letter to President Harding, Mrs. Kaufman asked that he recommend to Congress that an international agreement be entered into between the United States, England, Japan and

China for the control of the distribution of all habit-forming drugs. She also asks that a commission be appointed to investigate the drug traffic in the United States at the present time.

"America cannot win the fight alone," Mrs. Kaufman said, in discussing the letter. "The nations of the

world must join hands to stamp out this evil. It is not a question of arresting 'mopey' and incarcerating them in prison, or catching the little peddlers. We must get the big importers. But beyond this we must have an international agreement. The fight will go ahead in the United States, but we will work to bring all of the nations of the

world into harmony in an honest endeavor to stamp out the menace at its source."

**Hospital Ureod**  
Mrs. Kaufman is conversant with the drug in all its forms. During her social work in Los Angeles she has come in close contact with drug addicts and has first-hand information of the effect of opium, morphine, cocaine and other drugs. During a year spent in the Orient Mrs. Kaufman devoted a large portion of her time to the investigation and gathering of data on the opium industry in China.

As a preliminary step in California Mrs. Kaufman urges such measures as the construction of a State hospital on San Clemente Island, about sixty-five miles from Los Angeles, for the curing of drug addicts and the curbing as much as possible of the smuggling of narcotics.

"By that time the country that has neglected its air policy will be in a poor way," he said in an interview.

"Armies will have become very secondary affairs; everything will have become subsidiary to the air."

"The world will be a tiny place then."
