They Request Changes

Several changes in Oregon laws will be asked of the legislature when it convenes by reason of action taken by county clerks of the state in their annual convention at Portland, according to R. T. Brown, clerk of Umatilla county, who returned this morning. One of the chief things that clerks all over the state are anxious to see changed is the present registration law. At present only two elections are required to enable a voter not registered to vote in an election. In an effort to discourage the present practice of not registering, the clerks would make it necessary for the non-registered voter to secure the signatures of four electors before his vote can be sworn in on election day. Other matters were considered by the convention. "We had a very interesting meeting," Mr. Brown stated today.

RACE IMPROVES BY ONE PERCENT IN 25,000 YRS.

BERKELEY, Cal., Dec. 14.—(U. P.)—The human race has only improved one percent physically and mentally in 25,000 years, according to Professor A. L. Kroeber, of the anthropology department of the University of California.

In the same period of time, he says, culture has progressed 10,000 percent.

"Men's brains are only about 1 percent better than they were 25,000 years ago," Professor Kroeber said.

"We too frequently think that the man of today is equipped with a better brain than the man of 25,000 years ago. But the man of today merely is applying his brain power, through training, to different problems. The man of 25,000 years ago applied his brain to problems which now seem simple, but which were just as big then as many of our hard scientific problems today.

"Man's physique has also improved only about 1 percent despite all modern knowledge of the body and its care. "On the other hand, cultural things have improved by about 10,000 percent, as near as we can ascertain. Our civilization, our knowledge of living, and the standards of civilization have risen steadily, and will continue to rise, until today, with practically the same brain and physique, we have inherited 10,000 times more culture than we could invent at one sitting.

"It is reasonable to believe that this development of brain and body in the past 25,000 years represents the human average development of the human race. It is reasonable to suppose that in the next 25,000 years we will have improved another 10,000 percent, perhaps even a little more, as life has accelerated. On the other hand, our cultural advantages should improve in this time by a terrific figure, if the proportion is carried out."

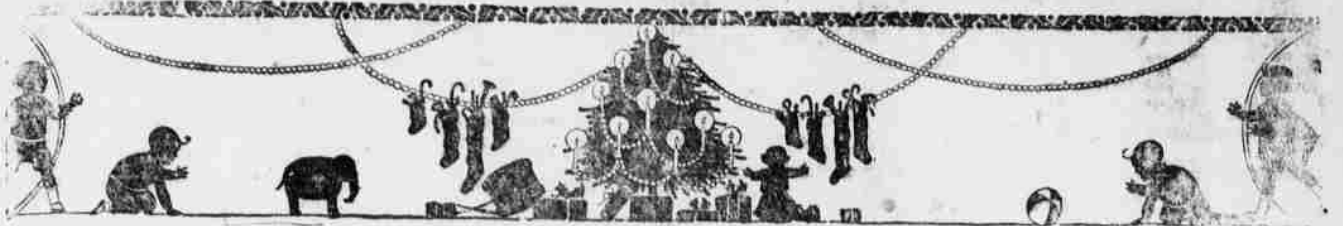
Professor Kroeber declared that "birth control" is "nonsense." "There is a popular cult which would prohibit marriage of so-called undesirable to preclude feeble-mindedness. Anyone, however, may be an unsuspecting carrier of feeble-mindedness. Therefore pronouncing one person as 'desirable' and another as 'undesirable' might be utterly false, unjust and unwarranted."

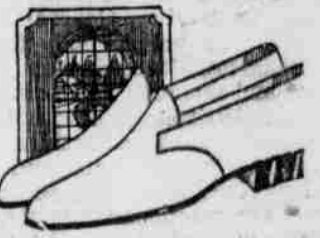

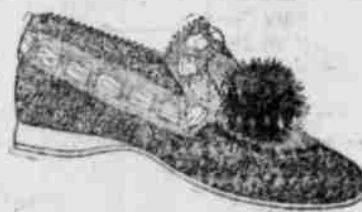
