

# People Here and There

William Johnson was here today from his home at Adams.

Sylvan Cohn left last evening for a business trip to Boise, Idaho.

H. K. Dean returned to Hermiston this morning after spending Friday and Friday night here. He is superintendent of the government experiment station near Hermiston, and he reports that one of the chief occupations in that district now is to keep near a good fire. The thermometer at the government station has registered 10 below zero on the coldest night, and the highest temperature since December 9 has been 16 above zero. Usually, Mr. Dean goes to Washington, D. C., in the winter to write reports, but this winter the arrangements have been changed. Instead, he will go to Arizona about the middle of January to give demonstrations in irrigation work. He expects to visit drainage projects in California and Arizona on his trip.

The Williamson county circuit court rested today in anticipation for next week's trial. With over a score of witnesses already disposed of the state expects to rest its case before the Christmas adjournment, expected Friday, December 22.

The chapter furnished materials during the year for making 118 garments to be worn by ex-service men in the government hospital at Walla Walla. In addition there were also 92 garments made for children. This is purely volunteer work, and the chapter co-operated with other clubs and individuals in making it possible.

And here is some of the work done in the county for agencies of the state about which little is ever said: The chapter co-operates with the Oregon Tuberculosis association by investigating cases here at the association's request; it also investigates cases for the child welfare commission of Oregon, as well as taking care of some problems of children for the state child labor commission. It also secures information

at times on requests made by courts of domestic relation and other agencies of this sort. It assisted four crippled children to secure adequate treatment under the state law applying to crippled children.

As the official representative of the American Relief Administration food drafts for a total of \$230 were sent to Russia from the county.

A big service for the ex-service men of the county is performed by the chapter. Much of the work of the U. S. veterans' bureau is done on information procured by the chapter, and the chapter has co-operated with both local and state organizations of the American Legion.

Another thing which touches the taxpayer in his pocketbook vital spot, to his own advantage, is the work that the chapter has done under Miss Kelly's leadership in rehabilitating destitute families so that they are removed from that list of dependents on which the county must be continually expending funds. Several families have been so rehabilitated, and some of them had been securing aid from the county for several years. The money saved to the county in this way has been one item of considerable value to the taxpayers from a dollars and cents point of view.

The chapter has also been used largely as a clearing house or central agency through which other organizations have carried on their charitable work. By centralizing relief work, it has been possible to prevent overlapping of effort and the extension of aid.

Some of the things accomplished by the chapter during the time Miss Kelly has been secretary:

During the 19 months from May 1, 1921, to December 1, 1922, \$14,219.02 was received and disbursed through the chapter office.

3850 miles traveled.

4350 persons visited chapter headquarters.

479 civilian cases handled.

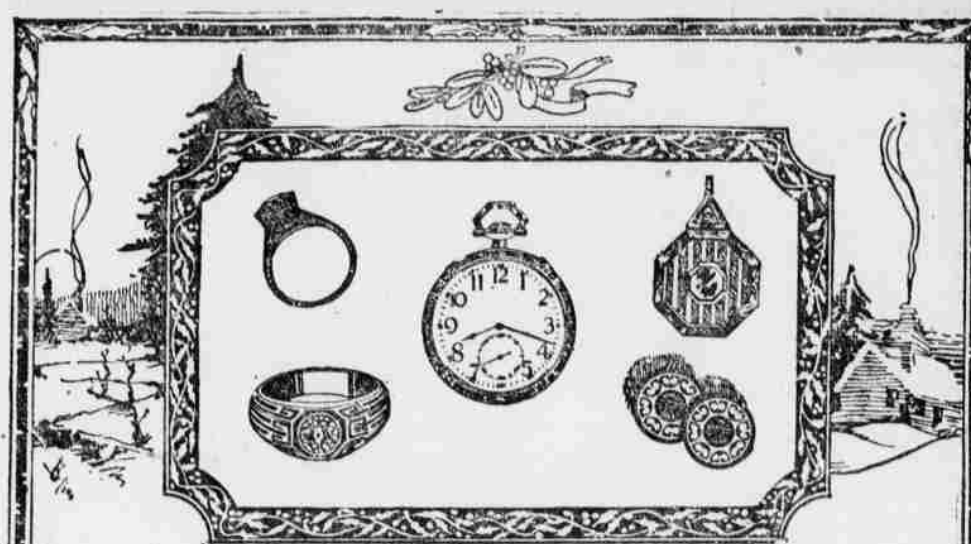

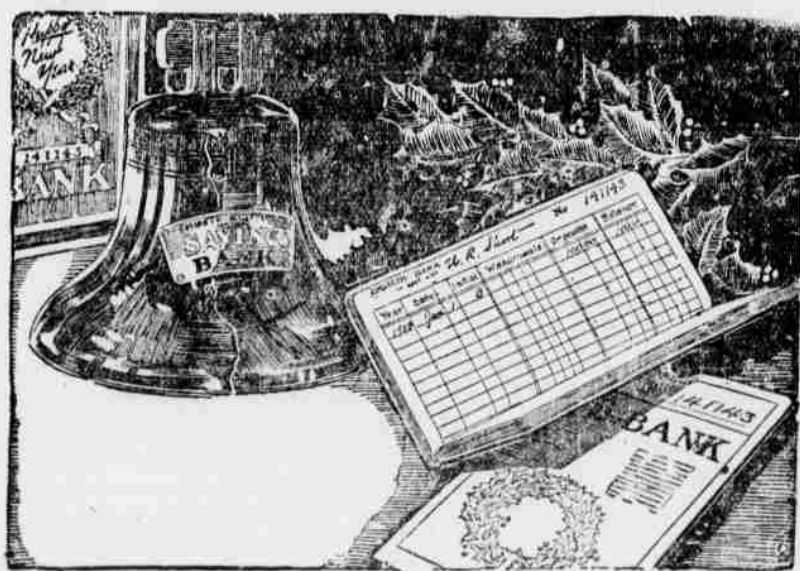
