Liberty Bonds

NEW YORK, Dec. 21.—(A. P.)—Moderate improvement in United States government issues and market irregularity in the rest of the list was noted in yesterday's dealings in bonds on the New York stock exchange.

Active buying of government bonds led to the belief that the January reinvestment demand was first making itself felt in these issues, liberty 3 1/2 gaining 16 cents on \$100 and the second, third and fourth and new 4 1/2 improving 8 to 12 cents.

There was not much demand for foreign issues, which exhibited a weak tone. Serbian 8s, Swiss 8s and United Kingdom 5 1/2s of 1923 each sold off a point and the losses in other issues were fractional.

Further weakness of St. Paul convertible 4 1/2s and debenture 4s, each of which dropped more than a point, was the outstanding development in the railroad list.

St. Louis-Southwestern 4s dropped 1 5/8 and the 5s 1/8, other weak spots in this group being Erie convertible 4s, series D, Seaboard Air Line consolidated 6s, New Haven 6s, Chicago & Alton 5 1/2s, and Pennsylvania consolidated 4 1/2s.

Paekard Motor 8s, Lackawanna Steel 5s of 1920, and Marine 6s were all active and closed at higher prices, while Hershey Chocolate 6s and Maryland Oil 8s, with warrants, were weak.

There were a number of bond offerings today, including two of \$1,500,000 each. Each was an issue of 10-year 7 1/2 per cent convertible sinking fund debenture bonds of the Merritt-Chapman & Scott corporation, which were offered at 101 1/2 to yield over 7 1/2 per cent, the issue being oversubscribed.

Eggs Are Lower At Portland

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 21.—Egg prices had another fall yesterday and the indications are the market will decline steadily from now on. The association cut its quotations to 50 cents for selects and 47 cents for firsts, while on the street candled ranch eggs could be bought freely at 45@46 cents and selects at 49@50 cents. Pullets were generally offered at 40 cents.

Buying prices were also reduced, bids being 36 cents for current receipts and 40 cents for honoraria. Another decline is expected Saturday.

The butter market was firm with a demand for all the cubes available.
