HERRIN MASSACRE JURY HEARS MUCH TESTIMONY

MARION, Ill., Dec. 21.—(U. P.)—A. W. Steele, foreman of the power plant near where the Herrin massacre took place, testified at the trial of the five accused miners today saying that he saw fourteen men shot down. His distance from the scene prevented his identifying the slayers. Ward Trivillion, a rural mail carrier, testified that Otis Clark, alleged mass murderer ring leader, showed him bullets he obtained from the pockets of C. J. McDowell, the mine superintendent, killed by the mob.

C. P. Schaffner, hardware dealer at Herrin, said that Hugh Willis, head of the local miners' union, sanctioned his sale of rifles and ammunition to a group of 20 men.

LONDON STIRRED BY SENSATIONAL MURDER

LONDON, Dec. 21.—(U. P.)—England is stirred over the condemnation to death of Frederick Bywaters and Mrs. Edith Thompson, convicted for the murder of Percy Thompson, the woman's husband. Bywaters is her lover and accomplice. Mrs. Thompson is with child and her home secretary is the only person who is able to save her. All of England is wondering whether her condition will affect the sentence against her.

Thompson was stabbed to death October 4 and the trial was one of the most sensational in the British history. In the testimony Mrs. Thompson admitted giving her husband small doses of a deadly poison to "weaken him" so he would succumb to heart attacks. She continued all this time to smile upon her husband and keep rendezvous with her lover and finally on October 4 she prevailed upon Bywaters to stab her husband and so put an end to him. Letters exchanged between Bywaters and a young naval officer, who was befriended by Thompson, containing many passionate passages, were exhibited in court. Thompson was stabbed while snoring his wife home from a theatre and expired in her arms.

Prosperity shown by bonuses at Christmas.

PROSPERITY SHOWN BY BONUSES AT CHRISTMAS

NEW YORK, Dec. 21.—(U. P.)—Prosperity is believed within halting distance, following a close survey made of Wall street by the International News Service correspondent. Christmas bonuses are indicative of better times. The end of 1922 means more money to the man who takes orders as well as the man who gives orders.

The Wall street canvass shows an increase from 13 to 29 per cent over the bonuses given out last year to be distributed this Christmas. Increased business is given as the reason. Many firms, unable to give bonuses last year are doing so this year, the correspondent finds.

FATTY ARBUCKLE WILL WORK FOR POPULARITY

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 21.—(U. P.)—When Roscoe "Fatty" Arbuckle, film comedian, returns to the screen it will be as an actor, not as a director. It was learned from Joseph Schenck, his employer, Schenck says after the holidays Arbuckle will take part in a stirring new film comedy. "Fatty" expresses regret that he is unable to make a Christmas picture to gladden the hearts of the children, but says he is determined to make good and keep his private life so ordered that the public will never have the slightest provocation for censoring him.

It has been learned that women's clubs over the country are preparing to renew their fight against the Arbuckle films.

Hays' Action Criticized. LOS ANGELES, Dec. 21.—(U. P.)—The Daily Hollywood Citizen, a newspaper in the movie colony, today declared that Will Hays has outlived his usefulness because of the pardon of Arbuckle. It condemned Hays for his action editorially. Word has been received here that many cities are already preparing to ban the Arbuckle films.

She is the daughter of the Bulgarian minister in London, and her mother is French.

At the Genoa conference Mademoiselle Stancioff acted as Stamboulsky's interpreter and translated his Bulgarian addresses into whatever language required. She shared fame there with Madame Averati, the Italian woman who converted the addresses of David Lloyd George and other English-speaking delegates into Italian with great oratorical effect.
