NOTORIOUS BURGLAR BREAKS FRISCO JAIL

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 21.—(U. N. S.)—William Huff, held on charges of burglary, escaped in the first city jail break here in the history of the institution. He pried off the bars of the jail door, scaled the vent pipe to the roof, broke the skylight and mysteriously descended six stories to the street. He is known to the police as a desperate gunman with two burglary charges pending against him in Portland, Ore. It is believed Huff hid in the prison, awaiting a favorable opportunity to make a break for the outside.

YOUNG MEN MAKE UP CHICAGO CUB TEAMS

CHICAGO, Dec. 21.—The Chicago Cubs will go into the 1923 National League pennant race with a team made up of more young players than any other club in the major leagues. It also will be led by the youngest manager in the older organization, William Killefer, 34, who was reappointed for a term of two years.

Forty players are on the club's roster to report for spring training at Catalina Island. The majority were with the club in 1922, when Manager Killefer began the process of reconstructing the club, and with the exception of Marty Krog, who filled in at third base latter part of the season, will be on hand when called together.

From this array of talent, a club of seasoned players is expected, which

should be an improvement over the 1922 aggregation, which made a creditable showing despite the fact it finished in fifth place.

Fourteen pitchers on the club's roster will strive for permanent positions. Of these, only one, Grover Alexander, is a veteran. Although handicapped part of the season of 1922 because of a lame arm, he still has considerable pitching prowess. Four are southpaws.

The Cubs are believed to have acquired star players in George Grant-ham and R. B. Barrett, who will contend with ten other men signed up for infield positions.

Charley Hollocher, rated as one of the best shortstops in the majors, should have no trouble winning his regular berth, but Icy Gribbs, one of the leading first basemen in the league in 1922, and an excellent batter, may find some stiff competition among the other young men.

Other candidates for infield berths include Johnny Kelleher, and Joe Kuesmann, who returns from Atlanta. Bernie De Viveritas also comes back for another trial. Ten men are slated to battle for outfield berths. The catching department should show greater advantage in 1923, as Bob O'Farrell has developed into one of the best backstops in the league. He probably will be the first string receiver, but will find some strong competition in Wirtz and Leo Hartnett.

EXPEDITION TO GO ON TREASURE HUNT

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 21.—(U. P.)—Cocos Island, of Robert Louis Stevenson fame, said to be the store house of pirates, is again to be the scene of a treasure hunt.

Two years ago an expedition was started here to comb the island and find the supposed buried loot. The expedition was never finished—it just died for lack of inertia.

The latest promotion of Cocos Island is not in the form of a search for buried treasure. It is an agricultural scheme.

From \$400 to \$1000 an acre can be cleared annually on the 5000 acres of the island, the promoters declare. Incidentally they mention that perhaps some settler may find the treasure—who knows?

H. M. Phipps, of San Francisco is president of the corporation which is to settle the island—maybe. Shares are being sold at \$1000—10 percent down. This entitles the holder to a co-operative interest in the products of the island.

There are no products of the island now. It is covered with thick jungle.

The island, which is under the flag of Porto Rico, is said to be owned by August Giesler, a German. Giesler has lived on the island for 29 years, but has not found the treasure. He is said to be planning selling out to the San Francisco syndicate.

CITY TO OWN RADIO

SAN DIEGO, Dec. 21.—(U. P.)—Determined to be the first in the field with a municipally owned radio broadcasting station, fifty enthusiastic fans are working on plans to raise the necessary \$20,000 to finance the project. The money is to be raised through the medium of a benefit dance, football game, and baseball game.

MUCH OF CORN CROP SHIPPED TO CANADA

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.—(A. P.)—Nearly half the exports of corn from the United States in 1921—or 58,582,806 bushels—went to Canada, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Much of this corn, however, eventually went to Europe, for Canadian statistics showed that only 12,000,000 bushels were imported from this country for home consumption.

Exports of corn during each of the first three months of 1922 were larger than during any month of 1921.

The second largest foreign market for American corn was the Netherlands, where 17,843,464 bushels were imported. The next largest markets, in point of receipts were the United Kingdom, Germany and Mexico.

Corn exports for the first eight months of this year exceeded the exports for the entire year of 1921 by 2,488,743 bushels, according to the Department. Total corn exports for 1921 were 125,974,505 bushels. For the first eight months of 1922 exports were 131,363,248 bushels, exclusive of 462,766 barrels of corn meal and corn flour, the equivalent of 1,811 bushels of corn.
