RUSSIA PREPARES TO EXPORT MUCH GRAIN

MOSCOW, Dec. 21.—(A. P.)—Export of Russian grain by use of foreign capital was advocated in a report to the central executive committee of soviets—workmen and peasants parliament—at its last sitting in this city.

The linking up of the rural economy of Russia with foreign markets is looked upon by Soviet officials as a means of bringing into the country foreign capital which would help in the reestablishment of both agriculture and industry.

This year's harvest of grain has yielded 47,000,000 tons, which is about 12,000,000 tons more than last year, and 20,000,000 tons less than the pre-war production. Allowing 7,000,000 tons for sowing purposes, 28,000,000 tons for the needs of the peasants, and some 3,000,000 tons for the needs of the towns, there is a balance of over 8,000,000 tons the greater part of which, according to the report, could be used for export.

In pre-war times Russia exported yearly over 12,000,000 tons of grain, or 15 per cent of her production. Since then the sowing area has diminished from 222,750,000 acres in 1918, to 135,000,000 acres in 1922, while the number of livestock has fallen materially.
