Mom was born 91 years ago in Prineville, Oregon, to Warren and Nona Brown. Two years later, her brother Buster (Warren) was born. Mom described her father (50 years old when she was born) as a man with perfect pitch, always playing the piano with lots of dancing in the house. She attributed this to her appreciation for music throughout her life. Her mother's sense of curiosity and wonder was instilled early in mom's life. There were always travel magazines in the house and trips to the library to read, which she attributed to her quest for learning and appreciation for art and architecture.

She went to school at the University of Oregon, graduating in social science in 1946. After graduation, she moved to Salem to work in the first Civil Service department in Oregon. There she met J.T. Monahan. After completing his law degree (interrupted by the war), they moved back to his hometown of Milton-Freewater and started his practice. They were married November 14, 1947.

The following years Mom raised a family (Jane in 1949, Kay in 1951, and Tom in 1955) and often traveled with Dad to Bar Association meetings as he rose to become president of the Oregon State Bar. She talked, over the years, of how much she learned during that travel. Learning. Learning. Part of Mom's core. Learning.

She served on the Umatilla County Mental Health Board for ten years. (She talked of how much she learned.) She served eight years on the Milton-Freewater School Board, six on the state legislative committee, and the last two as a board member for the Oregon State School Board. ("Another learning experience.") This led to her involvement in the Adult Literacy Program, where she tutored adults with their reading.

She was a member of Chapter AP, P.E.O. Sisterhood for 60 years, serving twice as president, a longtime member of the Milton-Freewater Art Club, and awarded Soroptimist Club's

"Woman of Distinction" for her contribution in the field of education.

Mom liked to take continuing education classes in a variety of disciplines including economics, theater, and geology. Over the years she enjoyed attending musical and theatrical performances. And for mental and physical health, she loved her Tai Chi. She would break out in a move at the park, in the living room ...

In 1986, Mom became a docent at the Carnegie Art Center in Walla Walla. Describing her involvement as a docent: "I have loved this service. I have learned so much, been exposed to creative folks and stretched my brain in so many different venues."

After her 90th birthday, she was asked to write about her "first ninety years," perhaps starting with how she described herself. She wrote: "I am, to each of my family and friends, a different person. Born in 'a time,' 'community,' 'geographic area,' and 'political atmosphere.' I thank the different people who have crossed my path for the different perspectives you bring to make me the person I am."

Mom is survived by her son Tom, daughter-in-law Teresa, and granddaughter Tia; her grandson Bleu and his wife Sandy with their children Tucker, Casey, Samantha, and Sydney; Mom's grandson J.T. and his wife Mary with their kids Ellie and Lydia.

She is also survived by an incredible community of friends that she loved and appreciated so dearly, who supported her so much, and whose friendships will continue far beyond her leaving this earth. She was so grateful for you every day. I thank you and our whole family thanks you all.

There will be a gathering to celebrate her life at the Walla Walla Country Club on Saturday, January 24 at 1:00 p.m. All are welcome.
