a handcheck foul on the Bulldogs with 4.1 seconds remaining. Cook netted both attempts to force overtime.

The Falcons Aleah Goodman scored the first five points of overtime, sinking a two and a difficult three pointer to give LSP a 54-49 lead. Hermiston guard Sara Ramirez drilled a three of her own and two empty La Salle Prep possessions were met by Edmiston free throws.

"It's probably the best defensive effort I've seen from our girls," Hoffert said.

Edmiston made 3 of 4 during that sequence. Her final attempts gave the Bulldogs the lead for good.

Edmiston was balanced in her scoring. She scored at least four point in each quarter and overtime on her way to the game-high 23 points.

"We talked to her about trying to be a playmaker. Her job sometimes is to break defense down and create shots. She did a great job of distributing the ball," Hoffert said.

Normal reserve forward Tavin Heddings filled in for starter Kynzee Padilla who stayed in Hermiston due to the flu. Heddings was excellent in the extended role, nailing four threes to finish with 16 points.

La Salle Prep had pieced together a perfect 12-0 start before Friday's defeat. Hermiston was the only other Class 5A team without a loss to an Oregon team. The Bulldogs' three losses came to Washington schools.

Goodman led the Falcons with 22 points in the loss.

Abi Drotzman had 10 points and nine rebounds for Hermiston.

The victory over the state's best completes the Bulldogs out-of-conference slate. Hermiston opens Columbia River Conference play with The Dalles next Friday at home.

"We talk about the first three minutes of each half is important. The kids did a great job, unfortunately we still can't do that for 32 minutes," he said. "We get going and we have that intensity and everybody is feeling pretty good, and then, 'Oh, this is going to be easy.' We relax a little bit."

Pendleton's largest lead of the first half came with 4:51 to play in the second quarter when Sonny Green hit a fadeaway jumper at the foul line to make it 25-5.

One of Caden Smith's ankle-breaking drives to the hoop stopped a 9-2 Baker run and kept the lead at 29-14 with just under three minutes left in the half, but Baker maintained momentum with Broadus allowing reserves to see extended minutes.

The Bulldogs finished the quarter on a 7-2 run fueled by 5-of-8 free throw shooting.

"We tried to get everybody in and it's their time to either step up and prove they deserve more minutes," said Broadus. "You have to have some depth because at some point in the season you're going to have some adversity — an injury, an illness."

"Every season something happens, so to be successful game after game and week after week, you have to have some depth. ... We've

got to keep improving on that and developing players. A lot of these players are young, they don't have a lot of varsity experience."

Baker pulled within 29-20 when Kyle Srack connected in the paint with 56 seconds left in the first half, but Quinn Cockburn answered by hitting both ends of a 1-and-1 and Pendleton took a 31-21 lead into halftime. Cockburn finished with four of Pendleton's six bench points.

The Bucks came out of the break on a 7-0 run capped by a Green layup and Baker never cut the lead to single digits the rest of the way.

The Bulldogs used a mini-run to pull within 40-29, but when Baker coach Joel Richardson was slapped with a technical foul for arguing with officials, Green hit both free throws and then sank a three-pointer on the ensuing possession to push it back to a 16-point spread.

Green finished with a game-high 20 points — his third time hitting that total this season.

"He's a guy that spends a lot of time in the gym. We have a lot of kids that are baseball first or football first, and Sonny is a guy that's a basketball guy and if he has free time he's in the gym and it shows," Broadus said of the 60-percent three-point shooter. "People are going to have to guard him, which is going to open things up for (the other guards)."

Green only dialed in from long range once on Friday, but was an active driver as was Smith, who finished with 18 points.

Wes Persinger added 14 points to go with 12 rebounds and three blocks, and Bradt added a team-high 14 boards and eight points.

"We're molding together, we're becoming a whole and we're learning what each player can do," said Green. "We're getting there. We're OK. We're settling with OK (right now), but we can be way better than we are now."

Pendleton shot 43 percent from the field for the game to Baker's 29 percent. Baker was led by Logan Sand's 12 points.

Pendleton has one more game before the start of Columbia River Conference play, and will travel to Irrigon to play the defending 2A state champions Knights on Tuesday. Tuesday's game will tip off at 7 p.m. Then the Bucks will open the CRC slate on Friday by hosting Hood River Valley at 7:30 p.m.
