Police arrest another in Oct. violent gang assault

The last man Pendleton police have been looking for in connection to white supremacist gang violence is in jail.

Pendleton police Chief Stuart Roberts said the law caught up to Bryan Alberto Corona, 23, who faces a charge of riot for his involvement in a bloody fight in October in Pendleton.

Corona, though, Roberts said, is not a member of the United Aryan Empire, a racist criminal organization of 20 members that started in 2012.

Roberts said the police report is not complete. According to initial information, Umatilla County sheriff's deputies spotted

Corona in the 2900 block of Northeast Riverside Avenue, Pendleton. City police then took Corona into custody on a warrant and booked him into the Umatilla County Jail, Pendleton.

Corona pleaded not guilty to the charge Wednesday via video from

the jail to the Umatilla County Courthouse, and Circuit Court Judge Lynn Hampton set his bail at \$10,000. Corona also reported he retained Pendleton attorney Will Perkinson.

Several members of the Aryan gang are in jail as well, including the founding member and others that have pleaded not guilty to assault, racketeering and conspiracy to murder.

Immunization records needed by Feb. 18

PENDLETON — School Exclusion Day arrives Feb. 18.

That's the day children won't be allowed to attend school or child care if records show missing immunizations. State law requires all children in public and private schools, preschools, Head Start and certified child care facilities to have up-to-date vaccination records or have an exemption on file.

If immunizations are not current, the child will be sent home. In 2014, health departments sent 32,345 letters informing parents and guardians their children needed immunizations. Oregon schools turned away 5,227 children on Exclusion Day.

Parents seeking immunizations for their children should contact their health care provider or local health department, or call 211Info by dialing 211. No one can be turned away from a local health department because of the inability to pay for required vaccines. Pharmacists may immunize children 11 and older.

Children 18 months and older are now required to get a two-dose hepatitis A series that protects against a communicable viral infection.

UMATILLA — Three Umatilla robotics teams are advancing to the next level of competition after a meet in Hermiston last weekend.

Teams 9060, 7499 and 7473 will continue to the district finals in Hillsboro, according to a news release written by the students.

Team 9060, an all-female team from Clara Brownell Middle School in its first year, did particularly well. The team ended Saturday's tournament as Columbia Basin League Champions and were also honored with the Motivate Award for team spirit.

Naomie Wyckoff, head programmer for Team 9060, said it was "a great rush" succeeding as an all-girl team in an event traditionally dominated by boys.

Team 7499 placed third and won the Innovate Award for their robot's design.

The teams were coached by teachers Kyle Sipe and Tammy Fisher and mentored by students from the school district's STEM Academy and the First Robotics Competition team from the high school that has competed at the national level twice.

Shadow, invited Pendleton Center for the Arts to exhibit half of the works in its East Oregonian Gallery.

The exhibit opens tonight with a progressive recep-

tion that begins with wine and hors d'oeuvres from 5-6:30 p.m. at the arts center and ends with dessert from 6-7:30 p.m. at Crow's Shadow. Both events are free and open to the public.

Frank Janzen, the Tamarind Master Printer who oversees the print studio at Crow's Shadow, was instrumental in providing technical expertise to retreat participants. Printmaking involves creating original works on paper using hand techniques and large printing presses. It differs from what is sometimes referred to as "giclee" printing, which simply

makes digital reproductions of an existing work.

The prints in the exhibit represent 30 program alumni and reflect the power of place, community and collaboration. The works will be on display at both venues through Friday, Feb. 27. Hours for both galleries are Tuesday through Fridays from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. In addition, the arts center is open Saturdays from noon to 4 p.m. Admission to both galleries is free of charge.
