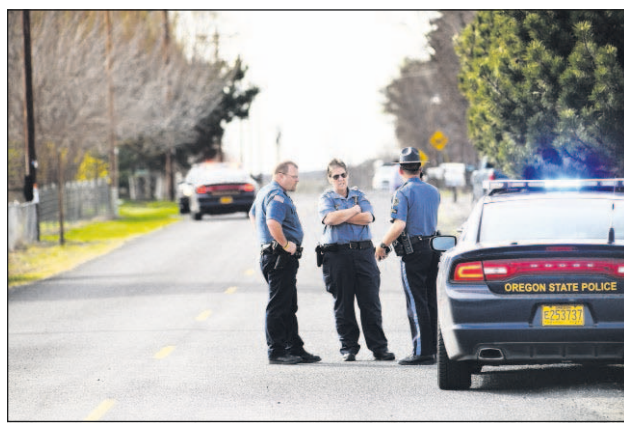

Teenager jailed for stabbing stepmother

HERMISTON — A Hermiston teen faces a felony assault charge for stabbing her stepmother. Umatilla County Sheriff Terry Rowan said the case remains an active investigation.

"It was kind of a family deal," Rowan said, when Danyell Dove Sowell "ended up going off and stabbing her stepmother with a pair of scissors."

The attack happened Tuesday evening on Bridge Road west of Hermiston, and Rowan said Charley Sowell suffered a few stab wounds. An ambulance took her to Good Shepherd Medical Center, Hermiston, and

an emergency aircraft flew her to a Portland hospital. Rowan said the last he heard she was recovering well.

Rowan said investigators continue to try and piece together what led to the attack. Hermiston police had an encounter with Danyell Sowell earlier that day, he said, and she may have had "some sort of mental episode."

The Umatilla County District Attorney's Office charged Danyell Sowell with second-degree assault. That could change after a grand jury hears evidence from the state. Circuit Court Judge Dan Hill of Hermiston set bail at \$50,000. Sowell has her next court appearance Wednesday.

Stolen vehicle driven to State Patrol office

BELLEVUE, Wash. (AP) — Washington State troopers arrested a 36-year-old man who they say drove a stolen car into their parking lot at a district office.

KOMO-TV in Seattle reports that a driver recognized the stolen vehicle from a post on a

motorist club Facebook post and spotted it in the Issaquah area.

Troopers say the witness captured video of Micah Hatcher behind the wheel of the car and used his cell phone to report it. The witness followed the car from Issaquah to Bellevue, about 11.3 miles, and then into the State Patrol parking lot.

Detectives say it was the easiest auto theft arrest they'd ever had.

Students protest against frat over nude photo posts

STATE COLLEGE, Pa. (AP) — More than 100 Penn State University students and other supporters demonstrated Friday against a fraternity accused of posting photos of nude or partly nude women, some asleep or passed out, on an invitation-only Facebook page, urging the administration to take stronger action against those involved.

The protest took place during a snowstorm in front of the main administration building. About 100 miles away, the university's vice president for student affairs, Damon Sims, told trustees at a board meeting that the scandal provided fresh evidence that more needs to be done about sexual misconduct on campus.

Back on campus later in the day, Sims said he would seek a meeting with all fraternity presidents this weekend. He also said he wants a review of the entire fraternity system, with a close look at its relationship with alcohol — which he had told trustees

is a major factor in sexual misconduct.

Protest organizers asked the university to put Kappa Delta Rho members involved with the Facebook page on interim suspension pending completion of the investigations. They also want the school to sever ties with the now-suspended fraternity chapter.

Sims, who met with the organizers, said summary suspensions are carried out only when there is an immediate threat, or danger of a renewed threat. He said he doesn't believe the frat would again produce such a Facebook page.

Student Peri Kahraman of Columbus, Ohio, said she took part in the noon-

time demonstration to help change a culture that has made women feel unsafe at fraternities.

"I'm here because this is a problem at Penn State, this is a problem in this country," she said.

A sign made out of a bed sheet read, "Rape culture lives here."

A cardboard sign read, "Boys will be boys," with the second "boys" crossed out and followed by "prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law."

Student Ryan Adam Myers, a resident assistant from State College, said he found it disturbing that some fraternity members feel "such privilege and such entitlement."

What he found most offensive, he said, is that some students "thought it was acceptable to treat another human being with disrespect."

"The fact that they're remaining part of the community right now is ridiculous," he said.
