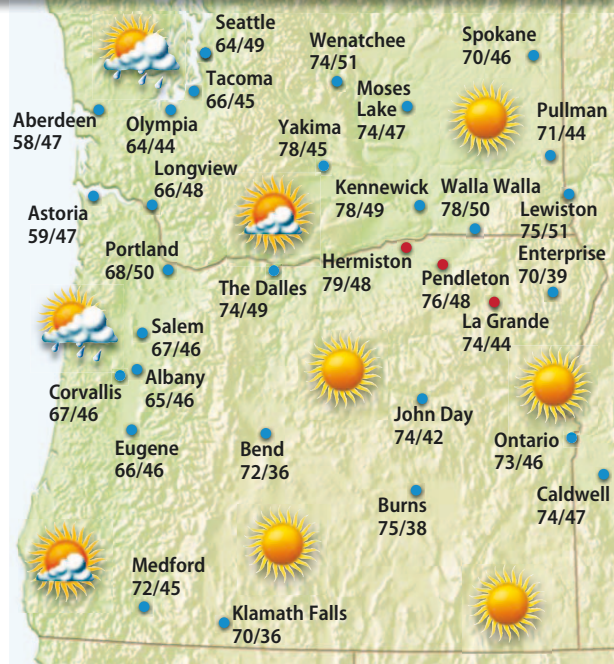

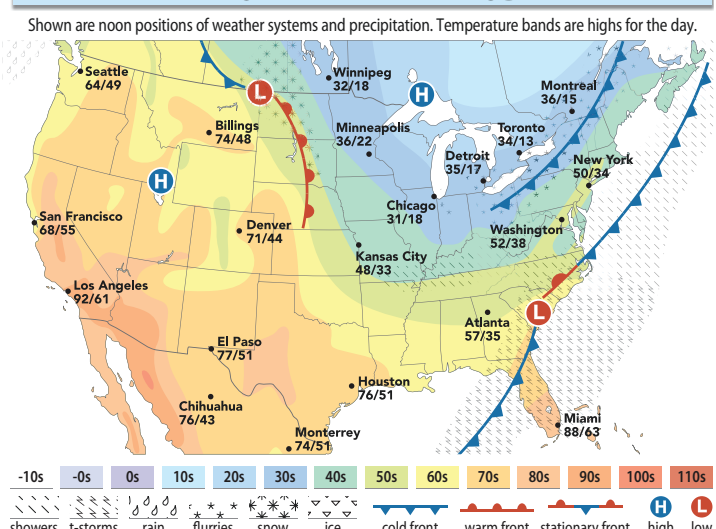

### House passes bill with money for timber counties

GRANTS PASS (AP) — The U.S. House has passed a Medicare bill that includes renewal of a program that pays subsidies to timber counties, especially in Oregon.

The House voted 392-37 on Thursday to pass the bill that permanently blocks physician Medicare cuts. It now goes to the Senate.

Attached to the bill is a two-year renewal of the Secure Rural Schools Program, which expired last year amid partisan disagreements.

That program paid subsidies to rural timber companies around the country to make up for declining federal timber revenues from logging.

Timber harvests have been reduced to protect fish, wildlife and clean water.

Last year Oregon got about \$100 million of the \$500 million paid nationwide.

### Narcotics dog who ingested meth during search dies

TACOMA, Wash. (AP) — Barney, the Tacoma police narcotics dog that became sick after ingesting methamphetamine during a drug investigation, has died.

The *Olympian* reports that the 11-year-old black Labrador mix died Wednesday night.

His handler, Officer Henry Betts, rushed him to a veterinary hospital on Tuesday after the dog touched his nose to meth at a Puyallup storage unit. He was with officers who were serving a search warrant.

Narcotics dogs are trained to alert their handlers to drugs by placing their nose on them. In this case, Barney accidentally inhaled residue from the meth.

Vets said Barney was more responsive Wednesday

morning but he passed away that evening.

Pierce County prosecutors say they haven't decided whether they'll amend charges against the three defendants to include Barney's death.

### Panel dismisses complaint against Democrat senator

SALEM (AP) — A state Senate disciplinary committee has dismissed a conflict-of-interest complaint filed against a Democratic lawmaker by the Oregon Republican Party.

Meeting for the first time in years, the Senate Committee on Conduct unanimously concluded Thursday that Sen. Chip Shields of Portland didn't violate Senate rules.

Shields asked state Rep. Lew Frederick to introduce a bill requiring the use of biodegradable lubricants in public construction projects.

Shields' family owns a company that makes such lubricants.

Shields has withdrawn the bill but told the disciplinary committee that nearly all lubricant makers have biodegradable products, so the legislation wouldn't give his company an advantage.

### Records flap: 2 archivists out of their posts

EUGENE (AP) — Two University of Oregon archivists are out of their jobs as a result of the release of 25,000 pages of documents from the president's office.

The school said the documents covering five years in the president's office hadn't been screened for confidential personal information or records protected by attorney-client privilege.

An economics professor, got the documents through a records request. The school hasn't named the library workers.

## State agency hacked; governor calls for study, changes

SALEM (AP) — Oregon officials said Thursday that they plan to restructure information technology functions after software found an external third-party had gained access to a state network.

Gov. Kate Brown said in a statement that someone gained access to so-called metadata last week at the Department of Administrative Services, which handles technology for much of state government.

The hackers weren't able to access to any personal

identifying information, Brown said. But metadata, such as the sizes of data and the timestamps of messages, were compromised, said Kristen Grainger, Brown's spokeswoman. Metadata is data about data.

"Although I have been assured that no personally identifying information was compromised, this incident causes me to have serious concerns about the integrity of state data," Brown said.

Software detected an intrusion into the agency's network, which happened

three days before it was detected, Grainger said.

The state's chief information officer, Alex Pettit, will now take charge of the agency's Enterprise Technology Services Division, who will work with the Legislature on how IT resources should be structured and funded, Brown said.

The state will also begin a process to find a management and organizational design expert to review IT standards, she said. The review will identify vulnerabilities and provide recommenda-

tions to fix them, Brown said.

This is not the first time a state agency has been hit. In October, tech experts received an anonymous tip that hackers had breached a database at the Oregon Employment Department.

The target in that hack was the WorkSource Oregon system that Oregonians use as they look for jobs at state unemployment offices.

It stores personal information commonly used on job applications, such as names, addresses and Social Security numbers
