28-year-old accused of arson in Albany high school fire

ALBANY (AP) — A 28-year-old man described as a Navy veteran suffering from mental health problems has been accused of burning down the cafeteria at South Albany High School.

The fire early Wednesday left the school closed until next week, destroyed its band and music equipment, and left officials scrambling to replace the 4,000 lunches the cafeteria supplied daily to other schools.

The suspect, Zachary Lee Burghart, pleaded guilty last fall to charges related to arson fires in the nearby community Scio, court records show. He was sentenced to probation and time already served in jail.

He was arrested Wednesday night on arson and other charges, Albany police said.

He is also accused of torching a travel trailer a few blocks from the school about the same time the school fire broke out early Wednesday, police said. The trailer's propane tanks exploded in the

South Albany, one of the two high schools in the city, has a campus with 11 separate buildings. The fire was confined to the cafeteria

building, which also housed band and choir rooms.

Nobody was in the building when the fire broke out about 3:30 a.m. The roof collapsed two hours later.

Officers who went to the fire saw a car registered to Burghart leaving the area, said Albany police Capt. Eric

Officers picked him up later Wednesday as he walked along a street near his home in Albany, Carter said.

Burghart has also been accused of ramming his car into gates at the high school as well as hitting a camper parked on a nearby street, Carter said.

In October, a series of fires on a farm at Scio, 15 miles northeast of Albany, destroyed a car, a pickup truck, a barn and about \$15,000 worth of hay, the Albany Democrat-Herald reported at the time.

Burghart was staying with family members on the farm and told detectives he suffered from post-traumatic stress disorder.

Old airport carpet finds new fame in Portland

SALEM (AP) — Visitors and locals lined up inside Portland International Airport to have their photos taken with an odd celebrity — a piece of nearly 30-year-old carpet.

By day's end, more than 800 photo booth-style pictures were snapped of people standing next to the segment of floor covering, hung up for an event called PDX Carpet Fest.

It was classic Portland, a city known for keeping it weird: a farewell party for the airport's trademark teal carpet, which is being replaced after three decades under travelers and luggage wheels.

"I guess this carpet is really iconic, and I can't imagine another city getting this worked up over carpet," said Sierra Prior, a Portland resident who posed for photos before boarding her plane to New

The unmistakably '80s carpet at the airport known as PDX is decorated with dark-blue lines and red, lavender and purple dots — a design meant to symbol-

ize air traffic controllers' view at night. As word spread that it would be torn

up, the weathered floor covering became an online superstar.

More than 40,000 "foot selfies" — photos people took of their feet on the carpet — were plastered on Instagram. The carpet got its own Facebook and

Some local companies started selling T-shirts, coffee mugs and other products featuring its signature pattern.

'I'm getting married on November 6th, and I think I'm going to have all my groomsmen wear the PDX carpet socks," said Derek Harguth, a Portland native who went to the airport to check out the PDX Carpet Fest.

Demand for actual remnants of the carpet has been so high that airport officials are giving four local vendors 1,000 square yards each to incorporate into items — including sofas, doormats and cat beds — that will be sold to the public.

One of the vendors, Carpet Mill Outlet, got a request from a fan who recently proposed on the carpet and wants to use a strip to make a runner for the wedding.

The floor covering largely flew under the radar until officials last year started putting down large swatches of a new carpet design to test it out. Some locals then realized how much the old carpet meant to them as a symbol of returning home.

Oregon committee delays vote on gun background checks

SALEM (AP) — An Oregon Senate committee is postponing a vote on a controversial bill requiring background checks on all private gun sales between people who aren't related.

Sen. Floyd Prozanski, the chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee, said Thursday he's delaying the vote because an amendment has been introduced. He says the committee will now be voting on Monday.

The bill mandates all gun buyers and sellers who aren't close relatives to visit a licensed gun dealer who can run a background check through the Oregon State Police.

The Republican-proposed amendment would remove the background check requirements from the bill.

Former Kitzhaber advisers ask judge to toss Oracle lawsuit

PORTLAND (AP) — Campaign advisers to former Gov. John Kitzhaber are asking a judge to dismiss a lawsuit filed against them by Oracle America Inc.

Oracle sued the advisers in February, alleging they influenced the state plan to ditch the troubled Cover Oregon health insurance exchange, costing Oracle millions of dollars.

In a motion filed Tuesday, the five advisers say Oracle's lawsuit interferes with their free speech rights. They cite an Oregon law that allows for quick dismissal of lawsuits that arise from participation in the political process.

Shooter's father released from custody

SEATTLE (AP) — The father of a high school student who fatally shot four classmates and himself last fall was allowed to be released from federal custody as long as he

Raymond Lee Fryberg Jr. was arrested Tuesday on a federal charge that he was barred from possessing the gun his son used in the shooting. Fryberg had been the subject of a protection order filed by a former girlfriend and was not supposed to have any firearms. His son, Jaylen Fryberg, used one of his father's guns in the October shooting at Marysville-Pilchuck High School.

After a detention hearing Thursday, the judge agreed to release Fryberg on bond. Fryberg agreed to make all of his court appearances and stay within the state of Washington. He also agreed to stay away from drugs and all weapons.

Bend council curbs vacation rentals

BEND (AP) — The Bend City Council has adopted rules to regulate the proliferation of homes used for vacation rentals.

The Bend Bulletin reports that rental permits have become increasingly popular — 262 granted last year.

Residents are complaining their neighborhoods are suffering from rowdy parties in tourist season, lots of vacant housing in the offseason.

The council agreed Wednesday that rentals will need yearly licenses, which could be revoked if, for example, noise is a problem.




