Track Town lands Worlds

BEIJING — After nearly four decades of bypassing the United States, track and field's marguee event is finally headed to the country that has been the dominant force in the sport.

The small Oregon city of Eugene, a northwestern town steeped in American track history and the home of the University of Oregon, was awarded the 2021 world athletics championships on Thursday in a surprise move that came without a bidding process.

The IAAF, the governing body of the sport, said the decision was driven by the desire to break into the key American market.

We have to give it to Eugene, to a city where athletics is like a religion,' IAAF president Lamine Diack said.

The 2021 worlds will be at Hayward Field, which will be rebuilt to accommodate 32,000 spectators for the meet.

Bucks take team title at PCC

Paden LaCoursierre took top honors for the Hermiston Bulldogs at the Pendleton Invitational, but it was the home Buckaroos that earned the team win Thursday at Pendleton Country Club.

The Bulldog senior carded

an identical 5-over 77 to Buck-aroo golfer Reilly Hegarty, but LaCoursierre won a playoff hole and Hegarty was forced to settle for secon. Three others arrived at the clubhouse one stroke off of LaCoursierre and Hegarty. The Buckaroos Brayden Pulver, Hermiston's Anders Lind and The Dalles Chase Snodgrass all shot 6-over 78. Snodgrass was awarded third place.

Pendleton finished four

strokes better than rival Hermiston to win the nineteam team competition. The Dalles took third.

Nathan Som and Jared Geier bolstered the Buckaroos winning scores, shooting 9-over and 14-over respectively. Zac Adams and J.D. Thacker rounded out the Bulldogs top four.

Mac-Hi finished in sixth place. Sterling Sandberg turned in a team-best 19-over 91 for the Pioneers.

"They're going to be tough to beat," Pendleton coach Greg Whitten said. "They return a lot of those same bats from last year. They've got the best pitcher (Ryan Ward) coming back from last season. Other than him, I don't think there's really any dominant arms."

Ward, a senior righthander pitcher, started last year's state championship game and is the only allleague hurler returning. Through 13 games however, he holds just the third best earned run average of starting pitchers on his own staff behind Kam Walker and Patrick Harvey. All three have ERAs below 2.5.

The front-running status is new for the Eagles. Since the formation of the league in 2011, the school has yet to finish in the top half of the four-team conference and has never turned in a winning league record. The paltry finishes includes a 4-8 campaign last season before they turned in a memorable string of upsets on their way to a meeting with Sandy in the title game. Sandy won its first title 8-3

Pendleton and Hermiston finished with identical 8-4 records a season ago. The Buckaroos took the league title based upon head-to-head results — they won three of four.

It's the Bulldogs — who like HRV have yet to win a CRC crown — who come into this weekend seemingly more equipped for a run.

Hermiston (7-4) enters as the only other team with a winning-record behind the tutelage of rookie skipper Lance Hawkins. Playing in their grandiose park at Armand Larive Middle School, the Bulldogs have posted the second-best defensive numbers, allowing 5.3 runs per game. It's the team's approach at the plate that has Hawkins apprehensive.

'We've got a lot of work if we're going to compete for a CRC championship," he said last week. "We need to put the dagger in and score runs every inning. We have quite a few innings where we go 1-2-3 kind of fast."

They've yet to plate more than nine runners in a game, and average a league-worst 4.6 runs per game. Aside from a walk-off home run from junior first baseman Tyler Sexton on Friday versus Parkrose, the Bulldogs haven't hit the long ball.

RJ Robles and Chase Root have handled the majority of the duties on the mound and have had aid of playing in front of a consistent defense.

The Buckaroos have won three of four league titles, but an improved stable of pitchers will be needed if a fourth is in the cards.

"We're going to have to score runs to win. I don't see us a throwing a lot of shutouts," Whitten said.

Pendleton has been smacked around for 10 or more runs on four separate occasions this season and aside from The Dalles, which have given up an astounding 9.3 runs per game, they rank at the bottom in the league with 7.3 allowed per game.

Whitten has settled on an opening weekend starting pairing of Quinn Cockburn and Brady Smith, with a slew of relievers prepared to enter if thing go awry.

The Buckaroos are also reeling from the injury of star catcher Alex O'Rourke. The Oregon State signee suffered a facial injury in a tournament in Idaho last month. His status to return this season remains up in the air. Cockburn and Zack Myers have been catching in his absence.

The Dalles' (6-7) play has been the most polarizing of any team through the opening month of the season. They've scored a ton - 78 runs in 13 games. They've allowed even more — 120. Based upon average, only one team in Class 5A has been worse defensively.

With three teams eligible for postseason play, the regular season may prove obsolete. Hood River knows that just as well after last year's run. Hermiston finished second in 2012, but was the last team standing from the league in the state playoffs, reaching the quarterfinal round.

Pendleton hosts Hood River Valley on Saturday, while Hermiston travels to the Dalles. Both doubleheaders are set for noon start times.

"I always took the approach that I wanted to be as aggressive as my trainer would let me so I didn't have any regrets," he said. "I didn't want to end up missing games just because I didn't feel like doing an early morning workout.

Before the season started I wasn't sure if I was ready, but then we had a few scrimmages and I was able to see that I could make the throws to first base alright and I started to get more confident."

Richards hasn't missed a beat since returning, and is fielding at a .966 percentage in ACC play with just three errors. He leads the team with 111 defensive assists overall, and is fifth with 52 putouts.

But while Richards is as good as ever on defense, he's come back even better at the plate.

Although his batting average (.280) is slightly below his career high (.282), Richards is enjoying his most productive season as a hitter.

His 13 RBIs and two home runs in ACC play leads the team, and although he's hitting just .200 over the last 10 games he's accounted for more than a quarter of the team's 40 runs over that span. For the season he's

also tied for first on the team with 23 RBIs, third in total bases (52), tied for third in hits (37), and fourth in slugging (.417) and runs (21). "The whole season I've

just focused on taking it pitch by pitch," he said. "I'm not really worried about (stats), I just want to make sure I approach every pitch and every at bat the right way.'

Which he said also means not getting ahead of yourself.

The Irish have four more three-game series left in league play before the start of the ACC Championships on May 19 - plenty of time for their promising season to take a wayward turn.

"The ACC is one of the toughest, if not the toughest, conferences in college baseball," Richards said. "You can't take any opponent lightly."

Notre Dame, which is just 7-7 at home this season, hosts NC State starting today. Their remaining ACC series after that are at Wake Forest (22-16, 9-9), against North Carolina (23-14, 9-9), and then at Boston College (18-18, 6-11) to finish the regular season.
