Farm-City unveils whiskey, vodka label

HERMISTON — The Farm-City Pro Rodeo announced Thursday it has left the chute and entered the liquor business.

The rodeo, a Hermiston staple since 1988, unveiled its whiskey and vodka label Chute Eight during a sponsor appreciation dinner at the Hermiston Armory. Chute Eight is a trademark owned by Farm-City Pro Rodeo Company and named after the entertainment venue at the arena.

Carroll Unruh, a Salem-based alcohol consultant who has operated Chute 8 since 1998, said a committee formed by the rodeo board settled on an image of two cowboys on horseback shaking hands across a fence — a tribute to the way Farm-City operated in its early days.

David Bothum and Butch Knowles, two of the rodeo’s founders and former cowboys in their own right, posed for the image.

“It’s fitting, because hard work and trust are the basis of everything we’ve done,” Unruh said.

The label also includes the trademarked motto “The handshake ... our word, our bond.”

Once the concept was finalized, the committee brought the package to Indio Spirits Distillery of Portland to create, bottle and sell the product.

Bottles and samples of the first batch were handed out after the announcement, and the spirits will be served at their first rodeo Saturday at the Tom Green Memorial Rodeo in Madras, according to Unruh.

Indio distills a variety of liquors, including Snake River Stampede Whiskey, a blended Canadian whiskey owned by the Nampa, Idaho rodeo of the same name.

MidCo founding family leaving bus business

PENDLETON — After nearly six decades in the transportation business, the founding family of the Mid Columbia Bus Co. will sell their shares.

The Flatt family has sold their stake in ownership to Canadian bus company Landmark Student Transportation Inc.

“We chose (Landmark) because they are a family based, privately held, strong organization that has many of the same operating principles we do,” Chief Operating Officer Bruce Flatt said in a press release. “They will maintain the same high standards and level of professional pride that Midco employees have built over the years.”

The press release states routes, staff, management and day-to-day operations will remain the same throughout the consolidation process. Current CEO Dave Lear will also retain his role.

According to the Midco website, the Flatt family were originally in the trucking business before they successfully bid for busing services for the Condon School District.

The company has grown since then and now provides school buses for 26 school districts, Headstart programs and education service districts in Oregon.

Through its subsidiary Western States Bus Services, Midco also serves five school districts in the Twin Falls

area of Idaho.

Since it was established in 2011, Landmark has acquired bus companies in Wisconsin, Missouri and the Canadian province of Ontario.
