Police stay busy with gunslinger, blood spitter

Hermiston police early Monday arrested a man on multiple counts after people reported he pointed a firearm at them.

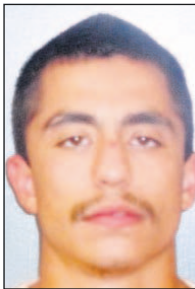
Hermiston police Capt. Darryl Johnson in a written statement said a woman at 1:08 a.m. told police a male dressed entirely in black pointed a gun at her as she was driving by 1030 S.W. 11th St. While officers responded, a second 9-1-1 call came from two women who said they were walking north on Southwest 11th Street when a male wearing black pointed a gun at them.

Police found Alexander Robert Sendlinger, 20, of 1390 E. Theater Lane, in the area, according to Johnson, and caught him after a short foot chase and struggle. Officers found a pistol and a dagger on Sendlinger along with a small amount of marijuana.

Police booked Sendlinger into the Umatilla County Jail on the following: unlawful possession of a firearm; carrying a concealed weapon; three counts of unlawful use of a weapon; three counts of pointing a firearm at another; three counts of menacing; resisting arrest; and second-degree disorderly conduct.

Sendlinger's jail bond is \$68,000.

police dealt with a messy drunk driving arrest and a burglary suspect.

Hermiston police at about 7:50 p.m. saw a vehicle speeding recklessly and swerving. That led to a traffic stop on the 900 block of North First Place, Highway 395, and the arrest of Saed Thamer Al Shuaib, 41, of 1150 S. Highway 395, No. C31, Hermiston.

Officers took Al Shuaib to the Hermiston Police Department for processing, according to Johnson, where police wanted him to provide a breath sample in an intoxication tester. But Al Shuaib bit his tongue and tried to spit blood into the intoxilyzer machine, then spit blood onto the wall, machine and an officer's arm.

Hermiston police booked Al Shuaib into the county jail for driving under the influence of intoxicants, reckless driving and third-degree criminal mischief. Police also cited Al Shuaib for failing to take the breath test, not having a driver's license and

driving uninsured.

That same evening a resident at 626 W. Highland Ave. called police about a Hispanic male trespassing in her yard. She said the male took a bicycle from her neighbor's yard and was claiming all of the property was his.

Hermiston officer Freddy Sotelo and Sgt. Bill Osborne responded, and a witness said the suspect was in the back yard at 616 W. Highland. Police talked to neighbors and the occupant of the residence, who confirmed she did not know the person and he was not to be on her property.

Police entered the back fenced yard, Johnson reported, and spotted the subject "sitting on a patio couch behind the house with a blue cover" over himself.

Police arrested Jovany Chavez Calderon, 24, of 515 S.W. 13th Place, No. D4, Hermiston, and booked him into the county jail for second-degree burglary, two counts of third-degree theft and three counts of second-degree trespassing.

High-speed chase ends with arrests

Oregon State Police arrested two suspects who tried to flee early Monday during a high-speed pursuit.

Oregon State Police Sgt. Mark Banks in a written statement reported a trooper at 12:07 a.m. tried to stop a 2007 Pontiac sedan on Highway 11 south of Milton-Freewater for an equipment violation. The driver of the Pontiac hit the gas and headed south on Highway 11 toward Pendleton at speeds up to 100 mph.

Other troopers placed spike strips on the highway just outside Pendleton. The devices damaged the Pontiac's tires, slowing

it, but it drove for several more miles. State police reported troopers then used a "tactical vehicle intervention technique" to ram into the Pontiac. The car spun out and the pursuit ended.

Troopers arrested the driver, Trevor Kelly, 27, and booked him into the Umatilla County Jail, Pendleton, on the following charges: felony attempt to elude police; reckless driving; recklessly endangering another person; driving under the influence of intoxicants (controlled substance); supplying contraband (into a correc-

tional institute); possession of methamphetamine; and failure to carry and present a driver's license.

State police reported Kelly initially refused to provide officers or jail staff with any identifying information, and police do not know his city of residence. Troopers also arrested the lone passenger, Kristi Higheagle, 28, of Pendleton, and placed her in the jail for possession of methamphetamine.

State police stated it had no more information to provide on this arrests at this time.

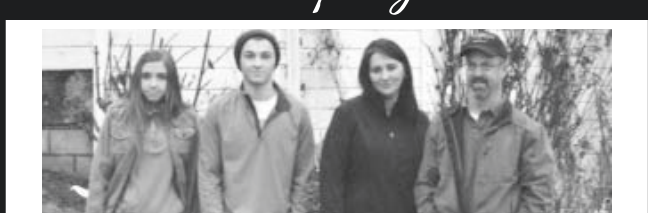
