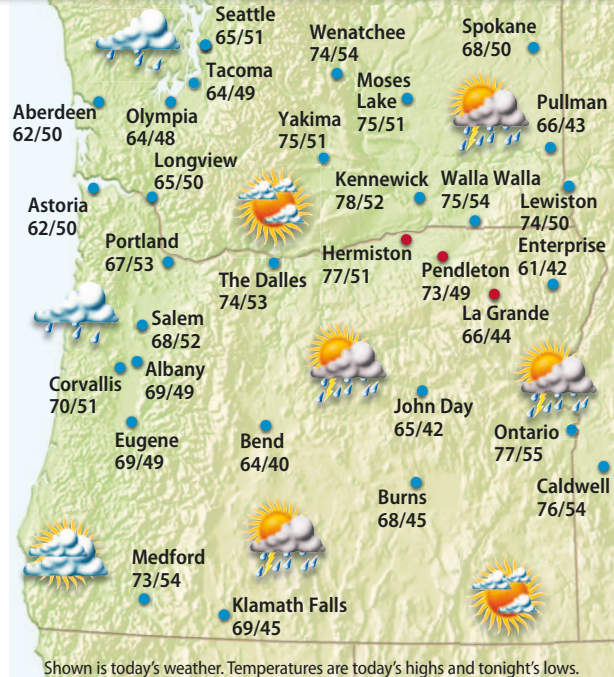

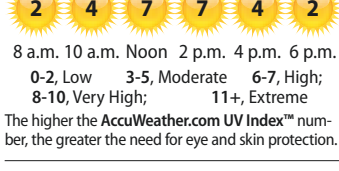

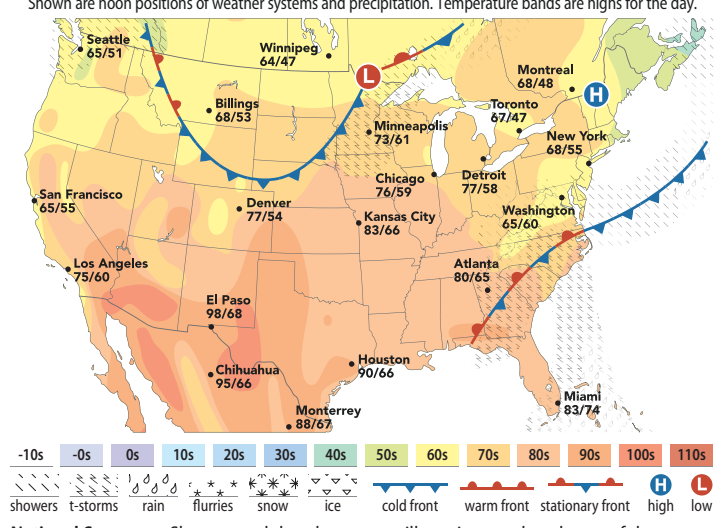

Oregon Legislature votes to expand birth control access

SALEM (AP) — Women are closer to getting easier access to birth control under two measures advancing in the Oregon Legislature. The House voted Tuesday to allow pharmacists to write prescriptions for birth control after women complete a risk-screening questionnaire. Bend Republican Rep. Knute Buehler, who proposed the measure, says expanding access to birth control could have profound implications on the health and financial security of women. The measure heads to the Senate.

Meanwhile, the Senate voted unanimously Tuesday to require that private insurers pay for up to 12 months of birth control at once. That bill heads to Democratic Gov. Kate Brown. Advocates say dispensing a full year of birth control can decrease the number of unintended pregnancies while ensuring effective use of the prescription.

UO fraternity sanctioned for drunken parties

EUGENE (AP) — A University of Oregon fraternity has been sanctioned after two drunken parties. The house

was supposed to be dry. The Register-Guard reports that a fall 2014 party landed Lambda Chi Alpha on probation until spring break. Then a post-break party brought a new set of sanctions that will last until June 2016, including a nine-month prohibition on parties with sister sororities. A UO official said someone under 21 had been consuming a large amount of alcohol at the fraternity. The punishment was handed down amid a change in how UO disciplines its fraternities and sororities. Campus administrators, rather than peers, now respond to violations. The changes are part of an effort to prevent sexual assault. The national Lambda Chi Alpha headquarters placed the local chapter under alumni control.

EMAIL: Administrative inquiry still underway

high-ranking officials in the capitol. Rep. Knute Buehler, R-Bend, last week called Rodgers a hero in a statement on the House floor. Rodgers provided the emails to the Willamette Week newspaper in February, after a Kitzhaber staffer asked state data center employees to delete emails from the governor's personal account that were stored on state computer servers. The Oregonian newspaper had filed a public records request for the emails, and the Oregon Department of Justice had just launched a criminal investigation into allegations that the governor and his fiancée, Cylvia Hayes, used their public positions to benefit Hayes' consulting business. According to a story in Willamette Week last week, then-state chief operating officer Michael Jordan told Rodgers to make a copy of the emails so that Kitzhaber's

top staff could review them. Rodgers thought that meant Kitzhaber's staff would decide which emails to delete, and felt he had nowhere to turn. Jordan later asked the Oregon State Police to investigate the email leak, before he abruptly resigned in March. The day after Willamette Week broke the news that Kitzhaber's staff asked data center employees to delete the governor's emails, the U.S. Department of Justice served the state with a broad subpoena for Kitzhaber's emails and other state records related to an investigation into the influence peddling allegations against Hayes and Kitzhaber. Rodgers and another data center employee, Technical Engineering Manager Marshall Wells, remain on paid administrative leave pending a human resources investigation. Jordan told The Oregonian he placed them on leave and requested the

personnel investigation after a disagreement over how to handle computers and cell phones used by the Kitzhaber administration. It is unclear whether Brown has intervened on Rodgers' or Wells' behalf in the personnel investigations. The governor did say in her statement Tuesday that "a data breach is a data breach" and the state has a duty to investigate what happened. In an email to executive level state employees in March, Brown wrote that employees can report problems anonymously to the Secretary of State's government fraud, waste and abuse hotline. Kristen Grainger, a spokeswoman for Brown, declined to comment on whether the governor has had any role in the personnel investigations. "The administrative (human resources) inquiry is still underway, so there's no comment to make at this time," Grainger wrote in an email.
