Oregon State tabs Stansbury as AD

CORVALLIS(AP) — Todd Stansbury, the athletic director at Central Florida for more than three years, was named athletic director at Oregon State on Thursday. Stansbury begins his new job in Corvallis, Oregon, on Aug. 1. He will be introduced at a news conference next week.

The move represents a homecoming for Stansbury, who was at Oregon State as an executive associate athletic director from 2003-12 before taking the UCF position.

He succeeds Bob De Carolis, who resigned in May after nearly 17 years at Oregon State, including nearly 13 years as athletic director.

Sandoval said Thursday he had returned to the clubhouse to use the bathroom during the previous night's 5-2 defeat and checked his phone. He says "first time" and "I take the mistake, I learn from it. I broke the team rules."

A two-time All-Star who left World Series champion San Francisco to sign a \$95 million, five-year deal with Boston, Sandoval said he apologized to Farrell and general manager Ben Cherington, who is with the team. "It's the wrong thing," Sandoval said. "My team is down. Ain't going to happen no more."

Sandoval was replaced in the starting lineup by rookie Travis Shaw.

Broaddus steps aside after one season

Coach leaves to take dream job at Mountain View

In his first season as Pendleton boys basketball coach, Brian Broaddus said he was able to glimpse a bright future for the Buckaroos.

Coming off a Columbia River Conference title and an appearance in the state's final bracket, he was excited to see what the next season would hold.

But when his dream job opened, Broaddus was unable to pass it up and will leave to be the head coach at Mountain View next season.

"It was a great year and I'm proud of the boys, really proud of the boys," he said. "They

bought in to everything I was trying to do and we really went farther than I thought we would in the first year.

"That was the hardest part for me, is leaving the group. I was pretty excited about the future. Kids were working really hard and wanted to get back to state and do better, so this is a great situation for someone. The kids expect to win now, and know how to win, and are moving in the right direction. I don't feel good about leaving, but you always want to leave someplace better than when you got it."

Broaddus, who has family in Redmond and Bend, guided the Bucks to an 18-9 record and the verge of a state trophy before a 67-64 quadruple-overtime loss to Churchill ended their season. But he said he's most proud of what the team accomplished off the court.

"I'm more proud of the work they did in the classroom. The

team GPA was a lot higher, we never had anybody ineligible and we never had any disciplinary problems," he said. "It's been a great year, I've made great relationships with not only my players, but all the students in classes and all the parents have been great. I wouldn't trade this year for anything."

He'll take over for Craig Reid at Mountain View, which defeated Pendleton 58-50 in the state quarterfinals before placing third.

Reid stepped down after 15 years with the Cougars so he could spend more time watching his son finish out his college playing career at Arkansas-Little Rock.

The Pendleton School Board will hold a meeting today to discuss Broaddus' replacement, who will also teach physical education and health classes at

M's end series with Giants in split

SEATTLE — Ryan Vogelsong and three relievers combined on a five-hitter to give San Francisco its major league-leading 11th shutout, a 7-0 victory over the Seattle Mariners on Thursday night.

Vogelsong (5-5), allowed three singles over 6 2-3 innings, striking out six and walking two as the offensively challenged Mariners were held to two runs or less for the 26th time in 67 games.

San Francisco capitalized on a botched double-play attempt for three second-inning runs off Mike

Montgomery (1-2), who allowed four runs and seven hits in 7 1-3 innings.

The Giants loaded the bases with one out on a walk to Brandon Belt and consecutive singles by Andrew Susac and Justin Maxwell.

Joaquin Arias bounced to second baseman Dustin Ackley for what

looked like a possible inning-ending double play, but shortstop Brad Miller dropped the ball on the attempted relay after the force at second, allowing Belt to score and sending Susac to third.

Nori Aoki followed with an RBI single and Joe Panik's RBI double

College National Finals Rodeo

Timberwolves barreling towards Saturday's finals

CASPER, Wyo. — Saturday may prove a busy day around the barrels for the Blue Mountain rodeo team.

Following Thursday's performance, the Timberwolves are in position to represent one quarter of Saturday's College National Final Rodeo barrel racing short go field.

Callahan Crossley has held the top position since Tuesday's opening performance, and remains there with 12 left to ride. Teammates Danyelle Williams and Jessica Lewis emerged with strong runs Thursday.

Williams stopped the clock in 13.88 seconds, to complete a three-round time of 42.39 good for a second place tie with Shelby Herrmann of Tarleton State. Lewis is in seventh positioning with a 42.98 time after Thursday's 14.22 ride.

The final 12 third go's will be held in tonight's final performance round.

The Blue Mountain women currently sit in third place in the team competition. Plenty of points remain on the table. Aside from the barrel racing, the T-Wolves have Williams entered in the goat tying and Makenzie Fuller in the breakaway roping. Each compete tonight.

Jared Parke ascended the steer

wrestling leaderboard with a blazing 4.6 go Thursday. The time gives him an aggregate time of 23.3 and launched him to second behind Tarleton State's Jace Lane through three rides.

Thursday's time is the quickest third go yet, and only Kalane Anders of Laramie has bulldogged faster, clocking in at 4.5 on his first go. He no-scored his second try.

Parke moved all the way to fourth in the men's all-around with the effort. He is also entered in the tie-down roping. He has the best two-ride score (21.3) of any of the 10 athletes completing their three-rounds tonight. Seth Cook of Weatherford College currently sits in the three-go cutoff with a 44.9 aggregate.

Blue Mountain is currently seventh in the men's competition. Tyler Potter is the only other BMCC cowboy in action tonight. He'll have his final go in the bareback and will need a monumental score to advance to Saturday's 12-man final round.

Team ropers Austin Thompson and Jordan Tye also remain in contention to advance to the short go despite Tuesday's no score. They currently hold ninth position with eight teams left to ride.

It was another night of struggle in bullriding. Pendleton native and Oregon State competitor Bryan Carter was one of many bucking casualties on the night, but since all 26 third rides to date have resulted in no scores, his 71.5

Hadden places fourth at Nationals

Pendleton trap shooter Ryan Hadden finished off another strong season by placing fourth at the 2015 National Championships on Saturday, June 13.

Hadden, who is a Sergeant First Class in the U.S. Army Marksmanship Unit, made it to the final round with 238 points after hitting all 25 targets in three of the 10 rounds.

Hadden, who now makes his home in Georgia, has fared well on the national stage in the past. He was the 2005 national champion, and placed third in 2011. He also

has won several medals on the world stage throughout his 16-year career.

Brian Burrows of California won his third national title in the last four years with a total of 245. He entered the final round with 237, but secured a one-point victory in a shoot-off.

Dustin McGowen of Arkansas was second with 244, and Alex Rennert of Florida was third with the same score. McGowen also claimed the junior national title.

Ashley Carrol of California won the women's national title with 251 points.

David Senter of Hillsboro was third in the men's senior division.
