Police chiefs question bill aimed to stop profiling

The legislature passed a bill this session to protect minorities from police profiling, but local law enforcement leaders question the added layer of bureaucracy it creates.

While the Pendleton and Hermiston chiefs agree policies against profiling are important and say they are not opposed to House Bill 2002, they are skeptical its approach will be efficient and effective.

The new law requires all agencies to have policies prohibiting profiling, which is defined in the bill as targeting an individual based solely on age, race, ethnicity, color, national origin, language, gender, gender identity, sexual orientation, political affiliation, religion, homelessness or disability — unless it stems from the description of a suspect or violation.

The law also allows people to submit profiling complaints directly to the Law Enforcement Contacts Policy and Data Review Committee. The committee would then forward the complaint to the agency in question for an internal investigation. The results — along with any that originated from profiling complaints directly to the agency — would be returned to the committee for review and data analysis. The bill allocates about \$250,000 to the review committee.

Pendleton Police Chief Stuart Roberts said he understands and supports the intent of the bill but is not sure what it will actually accomplish, except for adding to the 11 classes that were already protected by federal anti-discrimination laws. He said allowing people to file complaints with the independent committee “further erodes the credibility of law enforcement” and increases the likelihood of false complaints.

“I am in no way opposed to the bill,” he said. “I am just wondering how we can quantify the value versus the realized expense associated with creating another layer of government.”

Roberts said “complex, time consuming and delicate” administrative investigations would be taxing for small agencies. Further, the agencies would be tasked with investigating themselves, he said.

“There is no safeguard or identified sanction to ensure the investigations are comprehensive, fair and appropriate,” he said. “All the (review committee) will evaluate is what they are provided. The public does not benefit from any greater level of transparency, because the investigations are exempt from public records requests.”

Edmiston agreed that profiling should be prohibited but said the independent oversight of the review committee was unnecessary.

“I think this (review committee) at least appears to be an additional layer of bureaucracy that law enforcement is going to have to jump through ... and those hoops may not be readily known or established because of what appears to be a very subjective bill,” he said. “I am a huge proponent of local control, not state control. I think in law enforcement, when we talk about state control, we already have that in place.”

Hermiston Police Department already has policies that prohibit profiling, and Edmiston said he thinks the “overwhelming majority” of agencies do as well. The department also investigates all complaints against officers, he said, and no profiling complaints were received in the 2014-15 fiscal year.

Pendleton Police Department became the 23rd accredited law enforcement agency in the state in 2009, and Roberts said the independent evaluation of all of its policies, procedures and practices was more thorough than the limited scope of the new profiling law.

“I would much prefer a more holistic approach to problem solving versus the segmented shotgun blasting we are experiencing,” Roberts said. “Let the industry and judiciary identify what is acceptable versus politicians who are more apt to act on emotion than knowledge.”

Roberts said accreditation preserves the professionalism of law enforcement, and he questioned why only about 31 municipal agencies and six county agencies were accredited.

Edmiston said he has been looking into accreditation and believes it has value. He said, however, the process requires “a significant amount of time and money and resources on the front end to get there.” He said he has spoken briefly with Roberts about accreditation, but he would like to have a more in-depth conversation to better determine its costs and benefits.

New definition of profiling

House Bill 2002 states: “‘Profiling’ means that a law enforcement agency or a law enforcement officer targets an individual for suspicion of violating a provision of law based solely on the real or perceived factor of the individual’s age, race, ethnicity, color, national origin, language, gender, gender identity, sexual orientation, political affiliation, religion, homelessness or disability, unless the agency or officer is acting on a suspect description or information related to an identified or suspected violation of a provision of law.”

All law enforcement agencies must have policies prohibiting profiling.

People can file complaints with an independent review committee, which will forward them to the agency in question for an internal investigation. The results of all profiling complaint investigations must be submitted to the review committee.

Oregon Legislative Director Kimberly McCullough agreed that further steps could be taken but said this bill is a significant step in the right direction.

“There are a variety of methods for improving law enforcement,” she said. “This is just one piece of the puzzle. If accreditation is another method for improving things, then certainly we should be pursuing that as well, but this is a very important piece of the puzzle.”

McCullough said the expansion of the protected classes reflects “the reality that profiling doesn’t just happen on race.” She said agencies already have procedures for responding to complaints, and the new legislation only requires them to forward the results of the investigation to the review committee.

The committee is comprised of a variety of members, including people in law enforcement, McCullough said. She said the committee analyzes profiling data, researches issues related to police and minority communities and recommends better policies.

“This is actually an opportunity to improve community relationships with law enforcement because profiling really has some very negative effects,” she said. “If we can really show the community that law enforcement takes profiling seriously, we can rebuild relationships.”

The ACLU supported the bill during the legislative session, and only one senator and four representatives, including Rep. Greg Barreto, Cove, voted against the bill.
