GRANTS PASS — State officials say Oregon is in good shape to meet the lower carbon emissions goals for power plants set by President Obama's new plan for combating climate change.

The Clean Power Plan issued Monday by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency sets a goal of a 20 percent reduction from levels in 2012 for Oregon.

Department of ronmental Quality climate change specialist Colin McConnaha says Oregon is already on track for major reductions, with the only coal-fired power plant set to close in 2020, and utilities working on developing 25 percent of their electricity

# DA agrees with Bend man's self-defense claim

PORTLAND (AP) — A Central Oregon man charged with murder after the shooting death of his friend has now been cleared, a prosecutor said Monday.

Deschutes County District Attorney John Hummel said additional evidence and a polygraph test support Daniel Norquist's claim of self-defense.

It is never too late to ensure justice is served." Hummel said in a statement.

The victim, Andrew Cordes of Bend,

was shot four times shortly after midnight July 25. Court records show the weapon was a shotgun.

Norquist, 34, and Cordes, 30, had been friends for more than a decade and lived next door to each other in a duplex owned by Cordes.

The two were together for several hours before the gunfire erupted in Norquist's side of the duplex. Both men were intoxicated, Hummel said.
