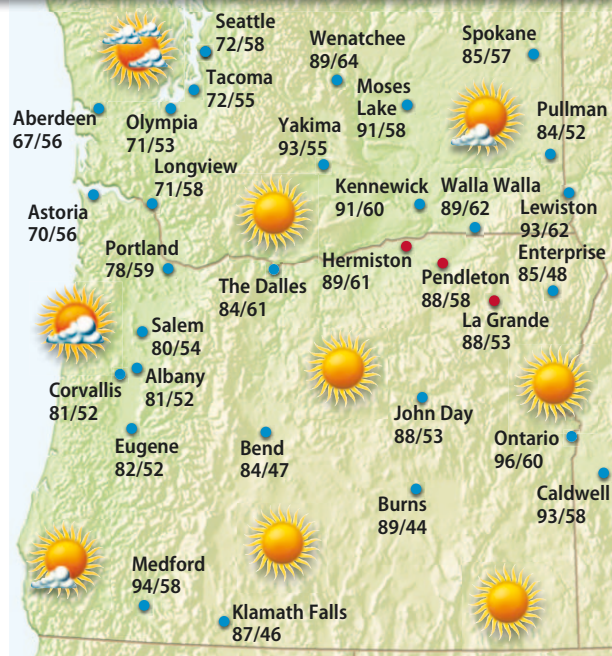

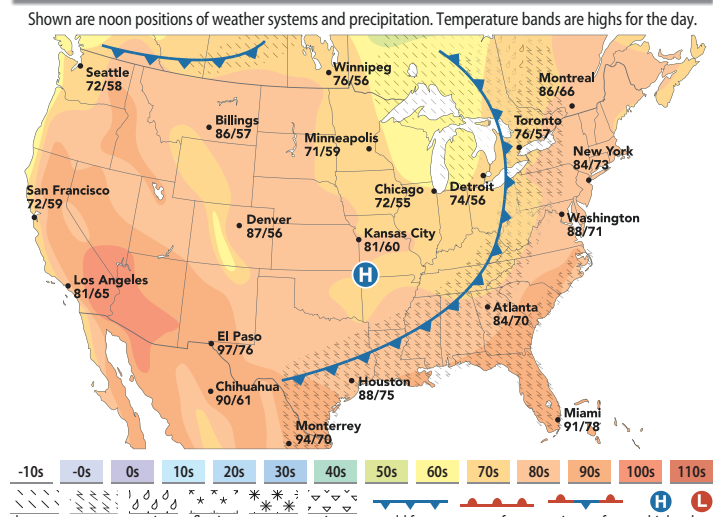

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Three firefighters killed in Washington state wildfire

Twisp, Wash. (AP) — Three firefighters were killed and three to four others were injured, at least one critically, on Wednesday as raging wildfires advanced on towns in north-central Washington, authorities said.

Okanogan County Sheriff Frank Rogers said the deaths, in a wildfire near Twisp, had been confirmed, but he said he was not immediately releasing specific details about the circumstances or the victims, pending notification of their families.

"It was a hellstorm up here," he told KXLY-TV of Spokane. "The fire was racing and the winds were blowing in every direction and then it would shift. ... It was tough on 'em up here."

One firefighter had been taken to Harborview Medical Center in Seattle in critical condition, a nursing supervisor there said.

"My heart breaks over the loss of life," Gov. Jay Inslee said in a written statement. "I know all Washington joins me and Trudi in sending our prayers to

the families of these brave firefighters. They gave their lives to protect others. It was their calling, but the loss for their families is immense."

The news came after officials urged people in the popular outdoor-recreation centers of Twisp and Wintrop, in the scenic Methow River valley to evacuate as a fire near Twisp grew to about 2 square miles.

The Okanogan County Emergency Management department issued the order for the towns, which combined have a population of about 1,300.

A larger group of fires burning to the east covered about 50 square miles and prompted the evacuation of Conconully, home to about 200 people 20 miles northwest of Omak — with further urgent evacuation orders issued Wednesday night for an area south of Conconully to the Omak town line.

To the south, more than 1,100 firefighters were combatting a fire that topped 108 square miles and was still threatening the resort town of Chelan.

Angela Seydel, a spokeswoman for Okanogan Emergency Management, said Wednesday evening that 4,000 homes in the region had been evacuated.

"It is really bad out there. The fires have just exploded," she said. "We're just directing everybody to head south."

A stream of cars poured south out of Twisp as dark smoke clouds loomed; the highway to the north was closed. Some people put sprinklers on their roofs in an effort to protect their homes, and others joined gas lines several cars deep.

The National Weather Service issued a red flag warning for the eastern portion of the state from 11 a.m. Wednesday to 5 p.m. Friday. Officials said temperatures will climb above 90 degrees and relative humidity will drop as low as 14 percent.

Drought and heat have combined to make this fire season of the most active in the United States in recent years. Nearly 29,000 firefighters are battling some 100 large blazes across the West, including in Idaho, Oregon, Montana, Washington and California.

Pilot walks away from plane that crash landed, flipped in Morrow County

A pilot survived a hard landing in Morrow County over the weekend, according to a press release from the Morrow County Sheriff's Office.

On Tuesday, police received a report that a plane appeared to have crashed near the Jepsen ranch in south Morrow County.

Steven Huggins, of Beaver Creek, lost control of his light plane while landing on a small private runway along Liberty School Road. The plane flipped and landed upside down. Huggins walked away from the crash with minor injuries and notified the National Transportation Safety Board of the incident.

Morrow County Sheriff's Office will not conduct an investigation into the hard landing, as it is under the purview of the NTSB.

Oregon parks department bans campfires

Campfires and other open flames are prohibited at Oregon state parks until further notice.

The ban covers any property managed by the Oregon Parks and Recreation Department and includes tiki torches, candles and fires on ocean beaches. It does not apply to propane stoves or charcoal briquettes used for cooking.

Deputy parks director MG Devereux said the ban was to prevent accidental fires that would further tax firefighting resources that are already spread thin.

"Most communities have sent local firefighters and equipment to help with wildfires throughout the state," Devereux said in a statement. "An unintentional fire in a state park would add an unnecessary burden to firefighting efforts."

Cylvia Hayes turns emails over to court

SALEM (AP) — Former Gov. John Kitzhaber's fiancée, Cylvia Hayes, has turned over thousands of her emails to the Marion County Circuit Court.

The emails were delivered on a thumb drive on Wednesday, two weeks after Judge Tracy Prall sided with the Oregonian in a public records dispute. Earlier this year, Hayes filed a lawsuit seeking to block the release, saying she was not a public official subject to the state's open records law.

Under Prall's order, court staff will review the records and flag emails that are subject to the Oregonian's public records request.

Kitzhaber resigned in February amid allegations that Hayes did private consulting work for organizations seeking to influence state policies.

Oregon health officials release draft recreational marijuana rules

PORTLAND (AP) — Oregon public health officials have released draft rules for medical marijuana dispensaries selling legal recreational pot.

The Oregon Health Authority's rules limit the type of marijuana products sold as of October 1 to seeds, dried leaves and flowers and plants that are not flowering. As expected, edibles won't be sold to recreational users at medical marijuana dispensaries.

The products can be purchased in limited quantities, including up to one-quarter ounce of marijuana flowers or leaves per day.

Only adults age 21 and older will be able to enter the dispensaries, which will verify age via a state or federally issued ID. Each purchase will be recorded.

Lawmakers passed legislation to temporarily allow recreational sales at medical dispensaries because full retail marijuana sales are not to begin until late in 2016.
