100 National Guard troops to help in Malheur National Forest

BEND (AP) — National Guard soldiers newly trained as firefighters have started arriving at fire camp in Eastern Oregon to help mop up a blaze that destroyed more than three dozen homes and burned through more than 115 square miles.

Fire spokeswoman Stefanie Gatchell said about 100 National Guard troops will be briefed Wednesday, then put to work putting out hotspots, mopping up, and rehabilitating the old fire line of the blaze, located mostly on the Malheur National Forest south of John Day. It was started by lightning two weeks ago.

The Bulletin newspaper of Bend reports about half of the troops are from Central Oregon.

Their arrival means other fire crews — in short supply around the West — can get some rest and be reassigned to other fires.

The wildfire started two weeks ago from lightning and was 42 percent contained Wednesday morning, with full containment expected Sept. 30.

A second group of about 250 Air and Army National Guard troops will finish training Sunday, Oregon Military Department spokesman Nick Choy said.

Elsewhere, firefighters have set dates they expect to contain

all 120 of Oregon's large wildfires, and unseasonable rain is forecast for Friday night through the weekend for western Oregon from Portland to Ashland, with a little bit making its way across Eastern Oregon.

The Department of Environmental Quality reports air quality was good from Portland to Roseburg, moderate in Grants

Pass, Bend, Hood River and La Grande. It was unhealthy in much of Morrow and Umatilla counties.

On the northwestern border of Crater Lake National Park, firefighters expect to have a wildfire fully contained by the end of September. Fires east of Gold Beach and east of Canyonville are both set to be fully contained

National Weather Service forecaster Jay Stockton says an unusually strong low pressure zone developing off the coast and will send rain across western Oregon starting Friday night. Amounts will range from a couple inches in the Coast Range to less than an inch in inland valleys. There will be less than a quarter inch east of the Cascades.

Attorney general probes Klamath County Sheriff's Office

GRANTS PASS (AP) — The Oregon attorney general's office is investigating the Klamath County Sheriff's Office, but it won't say

Department Justice Michael spokesman Kron acknowledged Tuesday that there is an investigation, but he said he could not say what it was about or what prompted it.

Klamath County Sheriff Frank Skrah issued a statement saying he was told by county personnel staff that a total of eight deputies — five of them patrol deputies were on paid administrative leave, at least five of them from the patrol division, and that he was not consulted.

Skrah did not return calls earlier Tuesday from The Associated Press for more information.

Klamath County Commissioner Kelley Minty Morris said seven deputies had been placed on non-disciplinary paid administrative leave at their request. Morris added that she could not discuss

"While the board of commissioners wants to be open with the public, there are just a lot of things legally we cannot comment on, she said.

But Becky Gallagher, a Eugene lawyer who represents the Klamath County Peace Officers' Association, said the state's criminal investigation is directed at Skrah. Gallagher said the deputies' union had gone to the county last week asking them to put the deputies on paid administrative leave.

"Deputies who asked to go on leave are all the ones interviewed by the Oregon Department of Justice as part of their criminal investigation of the sheriff," Gallagher said.

Skrah also did not return a call and email for comment Tuesday evening from The Associated Press about Gallagher's state-

Gallagher said the reason for the leave has to do with "retaliation and workplace harassment by the sheriff." The union filed an unfair labor practice complaint against the county because of the sheriff's actions, , Gallagher said.

According to that complaint, in May union president Corporal Daren Krag — one of the deputies who is on leave — sent an email to Skrah outlining union-related issues having to do with court security, body-armor vests, and Krag not being paid for overtime

In response, the complaint says, the sheriff changed Krag's shift, cancelled his participation in some activities and declined to pay his overtime. The complaint, which was filed on May 21, also says Skrah issued a write-up to Krag for not completing an inventory memo on time.

According to the complaint, the above actions were taken by the sheriff to "chill, impede, retaliate and interfere" with the deputies' union business and the work of its president.

Gallagher did not say why the other deputies were also on leave.

Review finds Hanford plant vulnerabilities

RICHLAND, Wash. (AP) — A partial review of an unfinished nuclear waste treatment plant on the Hanford Nuclear Reservation found 362 vulnerabilities in its design, according to the watchdog group Hanford Challenge, which obtained a leaked copy of the review.

The Tri-City Herald reported Wednesday that the information in the review was a surprise because the U.S. Department of Energy told the state of Washington that there were no major known technical issues remaining for the plant's Low Activity Waste

Contractor Bechtel National, which is designing and building the plant for the Energy Department, said the review is an example of the oversight that is a standard part of the vitrification plant project.

Hanford, located near Richland, for decades made plutonium for nuclear weapons. The site is now engaged in cleaning up the nation's largest collection of nuclear waste.

The \$12.3 billion Hanford vitrification plant is designed to turn nuclear waste into a glasslike substance for eventual burial. Work on the plant has stopped while design and safety issues are addressed.

The Low Activity Waste Facility is one of four major buildings being built on the vitrification plant campus. It is expected to start operating in 2022.

Bechtel said it provided the review team with comments on an early version of the report.

The draft contained factual inaccuracies and fewer than 5 percent of the comments were new and none were major, Bechtel said. The issues are being addressed, Bechtel said.

"Unfortunately, today's new details about problems with constructing the Hanford Waste Treatment Plant are not surprising," said U.S. Sen. Ron Wyden, D-Oregon. "The safety issues at Hanford, coupled with multiple failed attempts to silence whistleblowers speaking out about concerns at the site, have been ongoing."

Wyden said the report was released by an employee who was afraid to come forward publicly.


