PENDLETON **Children's Museum closed during renovation project**

The Children's Museum of Eastern Oregon is working on its Roads to Discovery Project.

With the project including replacing the flooring, the museum is closed through Saturday, Sept. 19.

The new flooring will feature a new educational feature. The damaged carpeting is being replaced with an industrial durable tile that will simulate a roadway to the exhibits in the museum.


