Rio Olympic ceremonies to be 'low budget'

RIO DE JANEIRO (AP) — The opening and closing ceremonies for the Rio Olympics and Paralympics will be low-budget productions compared to three years ago in London, or in Beijing in 2008.

Fernando Meirelles, the Brazilian filmmaker and part of the creative team, estimated Tuesday that Rio will spend one-tenth what London did on four major ceremonies.

Meirelles is aware that Brazil is mired in recession, inflation has reached 10 percent and the country is beset with political and economic upheaval.

Meirelles says he would be "ashamed to waste what London spent in a country where we need sanitation" and that he is "very glad we're not spending money like crazy."

London spent about \$104 million at 2012 exchange rates on the four ceremonies.

Cowboys place Romo on short-term IR

IRVING, Texas (AP) — The Cowboys have placed Tony Romo on the injured list with a designation to return, sidelining the quarterback for at least seven games after he broke his left collarbone against Philadelphia.

Romo will be eligible to return Nov. 22 at Miami. He can practice again in six weeks, starting Nov. 4. Brandon Weeden will start in his place Sunday at home against Atlanta.

Dallas also put defensive tackle Terrell McClain on season-ending injured reserve Tuesday with a toe injury sustained last weekend against the Eagles. And the team signed running back Gus Johnson back to the practice squad after waiving him last week. Johnson takes the spot of linebacker Joe Thomas, who was signed by Green Bay on Monday.

T-Wolves red hot heading into heart of schedule

BMCC shoots up standings with winning streak

The Blue Mountain volleyball team heads back into league play today at Wenatchee Valley looking to extend its 16-match winning streak.

The T-Wolves, which lost their first three matches of the year, have been red hot of late and are coming off a tournament championship at the Clackamas Crossover this past weekend to cap a run of 16 matches in 13 days.

Blue Mountain (22-5, 2-0) has the best record in the Northwest Athletic Conference (NWAC) and 10 more wins than any other team in the NWAC East.

The three-time defending NWAC champions also have the most sets won in the conference, 70, with no other team winning more than 55.

Coach Dave Baty said the program's recent success may have had a hand in its slow start this season.

"Last year's team was 50-4 and this year's team is not, and I think when they started off they were trying to be 51-4, 52-4," he said.

TigerScots defeat Mustangs

Errors plague both sides as TigerScots get first league win

The Weston-McEwen TigerScots had no trouble finding consistency in 2015, winning 10 out of their 16 non-league games.

Tuesday night the TigerScots opened up play in the Columbia Basin Conference and showed that consistency with a straight-set 3-0 win over the Heppner Mustangs.

After a pair of close wins in the first two sets 25-18 and 25-23 for Weston-McEwen, the TigerScots (11-6, 1-0) flexed their muscles in the third set and rolled to a 25-14 win to capture the match.

"Anytime you can start league off 1-0 that's great," said TigerScots coach Shawn White. "Starting with a win over Heppner is big, too, because they're always tough and play well, so it's a great place to start the season in."

The TigersScots held a clear height advantage in the game with three players 5-feet-11 or taller, and definitely used it to their advantage.

Sarah Finifrock and her six-foot-tall frame led the TigerScots with 11 kills and four aces from the serving line.

"We do our best," said White. "In volleyball you can either jump high or be tall and we are tall so we're going to continue to use that to our advantage as much as we can."

Junior Sara von Borstel was second on the team with seven kills and smacked three aces from the serving line.
