Alberto, batting last and only in the lineup because star third baseman Adrian Beltre was out with a strained back, made an error that led to Toronto's first two runs. He delivered an RBI single with two outs in the 14th, and Delino DeShields followed with an infield hit for another run.

Alberto, a 22-year-old rookie who made his big league debut this season, also had a sacrifice fly.

Texas shut out the highest-scoring team in the majors after the fifth inning. The victory for first-year manager Jeff Banister's team made road clubs 5-0 in the playoffs so far — the only previous time that happened

in the postseason was the all-Chicago Series, STATS said.

Keone Kela (1-0) worked one inning for the win, staying calm after a dustup with Toronto slugger Josh Donaldson.

Donaldson was back in the lineup after taking a knee to the head trying to break up a double play in the opener. He homered in his return.

Mike Napoli hit a tying single for Texas in the eighth.

Highline Public Schools spokeswoman Catherine Carbone Rogers says Bui received surgery at a Seattle hospital and was listed in critical condition Sunday.

Bui was a wide receiver and defensive back.

Seahawks take No. 2 defense into sold-out Jungle

CINCINNATI — For the first time this season, Paul Brown Stadium will be filled. That says it all about the unbeaten Bengals' next game.

Even though they've been very impressive while going 4-0, they've yet to catch everyone's imagination and stamp themselves as an elite team. After four straight first-round playoff losses, their legacy is defined not by October but by January.

Still, a win on Sunday over the two-time NFC champion Seahawks (2-2) would go a long way in redefining them.

'We're getting tired of not getting over that hump," cornerback Dre Kirkpatrick said. "It gets frustrating, the criticism that people have brought to us."

Here's their chance to end some of it. They've got a lot in their favor as they host a Seattle team hasn't looked like a back-to-back Super Bowl participant so far.

The Seahawks needed a late turnover and a non-call to beat the Lions 13-10 on Monday night and avoid a 1-3 start. Kam Chancellor stripped the ball from Calvin Johnson as he neared the goal line, and K.J. Wright

knocked the ball out of the end zone — an illegal move that wasn't flagged.

Seattle's defense has been championship caliber, allowing no touchdowns and only one field goal in opponents' past 20 possessions. Perhaps its best test yet is against Andy Dalton, who is second in the NFL with a 123 passer rating, trailing only Aaron Rodgers at 125.9.

Dalton has been the NFL's most productive passer in the fourth quarter and on third down, a main reason why the Bengals are still unbeaten.

Now, it's the NFL's second-ranked offense against

the second-ranked defense. "We've just played

really good football, and the guys are starting to get that feeling," coach Pete Carroll said. "It takes time to develop and get that sense, but they really are starting to get that feeling. Now here we go with the best challenge in the NFL, so we'll see what that all means."

Seattle's offensive line, however, is a huge concern. Russell Wilson was sacked six times by Detroit and has been dropped 18 times in four games. Seattle overhauled the line in the offseason, but it hasn't been able to protect Wilson or get the running game going consistently.

"We're continuing to work through the process with those guys," offensive

coordinator Darrell Bevell said. "We like where they're at, but obviously we need them to continue to grow."

LYNCH RULED OUT: Marshawn Lynch will miss a second straight week for the Seattle Seahawks due to a hamstring strain.

The team on Friday officially ruled Lynch out for Sunday's game against the Cincinnati Bengals.

Lynch injured hamstring in the second quarter of the team's 26-0 victory over the Chicago Bears in Week 3. Lynch returned to limited participation in practice on Thursday but is not ready to return. He will not travel with the team to Cincinnati.

"He could try to come back and play but we think he'd be vulnerable," Seahawks coach Pete Carroll said. "He needs another weekend to get through it and then by next week, by Wednesday or something, we think we can get him going again. We're just about over the hump." Backup Fred Jackson is

listed as questionable after suffering a high-ankle sprain last week against Detroit. Carroll was optimistic that Jackson would be able to play.

"We're thinking he's going to make it," Carroll said. "He'll have to work out on game day but he looks really good and we think he's going to play." Carroll said the team may

need to make a roster move to add running back depth before the game. Rod Smith would be the likely option to be elevated from the practice squad.

Cornerbacks Tharold Simon and Marcus Burley have also been ruled out for Seattle. Simon has a dislocated

toe that isn't healing properly.
"Nature has given him a toe that's got some issues and we've just got to work through it," Carroll said. "He's had surgery on his other foot — same toe, same situation — so that's something we're trying to work through right now to see if that's necessary or not."

Burley suffered a broken thumb last week against the Lions and had surgery on Thursday. Carroll said Burley should only miss around three weeks.
