No charges filed against Riverside football coach

Morrow County District Attorney Justin Nelson will not file criminal charges against a Boardman high school football coach who got into an altercation with a 17-year-old student athlete.

The incident was reported Oct. 12, when Riverside High School assistant coach Neil Livingston was seen knocking a player down Pirates football during practice.

admitted Livingston there was an incident, but described it as "just kind of an awkward football play.' He said he was standing on the field when he turned and saw the student running at him full speed from behind, and put his hands up to keep from getting hit.

"I redirected him and fell over," Livingston said. "The momentum from that caused both of us to fall to the

One play earlier, Livingston said the same student came up from behind and hit him on the shoulder. After the next play — the one where Livingston put up his hands — he said he pulled the student back up and told him to stop hitting him in the

Neither one of them were hurt.

According to Nelson, the student admitted he "nudged" Livingston on the shoulder the first time, but meant it playfully. On the next play, the student claimed he was running to block another player on the field when

Livingston collided with him. Police interviewed Livingston, the student, the student's father, four other coaches and seven players, who each gave accounts of the story. The student and his father declined to press

Based on the facts of the

case, Nelson said he would not file charges either but encouraged anyone with more information to get in touch with Boardman police.

However, Morrow County Superintendent Dirk Dirksen said the school district is continuing its own investigation and Livingston remains on leave.

Livingston said he has no bad feelings toward the student, and didn't think the situation should have escalated to this point.

"The kid is a good kid ... I've never had any problems with him in any way," Livingston said.

In addition to coaching football, Livingston is a former Boardman city councilor, member of the city's budget committee and owner of DeadRock Sporting Goods in Boardman.

New events center proposed for community

Oktoberfest raises \$20K for project

As the owner of an Old West-style chuckwagon catering service in Arlington, "Rattlesnake" Rod McGuire is used to cooking for large parties.

Which is how McGuire came up with the idea to build a landmark events center in the community, where people from across the region could have weddings, festivals and other large get-togethers.

McGuire pitched his vision — which he named the Woolery, in honor of Arlington's sheep and livestock heritage — at a town hall meeting in February. Since then, the nonprofit Friends of Gilliam County formed over the summer to start rallying support for the project.

Their first major fundraiser, the inaugural Arlington Oktoberfest, brought in approximately \$20,000, McGuire said. The celebration included a dinner, dance and auction Saturday night, with people coming from all over the Columbia River Gorge and Eastern Oregon.

"It was a huge, wonderful, beautiful event," McGuire said. "People believe in this building from a long ways away. That's what I'm trying to create.

McGuire, who lives in the tiny rural community of Olex, halfway between Arlington and Condon, operates Paradise Rose Catering, serving western cuisine out of an 1880s chuckwagon. He remembers working a local benefit dinner three years ago to raise money for a family whose house burned down, which was held at the Rock Creek Schoolhouse. It was charming, he said, but

pretty cramped.

That's when the concept for the Woolery started taking shape. McGuire proposed building what he described as a "big, classy barn," something with a grange-like feel that could hold at least 300 people. But his idea didn't gain any traction until he laid it all out at a town hall meeting Feb. 24, which 125 people attended.

"They stood up and said 'Let's get it done," McGuire

The Friends of Gilliam County formed with five board members and organized the Arlington Oktoberfest to get McGuire's proposal off the ground. They eventually hope to secure 10 acres of a roughly 40-acre parcel owned by the city near the airport, atop a high desert ridge visible from the freeway.

The city can provide water and electricity to the site, but not sewer, McGuire

said. The group hasn't surveyed the land yet, but will look into installing their own septic system. "Once we know the

septic can go there, we're off and running," McGuire said. "Then we can apply for grants." McGuire is confident

the Woolery would provide a shot in the arm to Arlington's economy, becoming a feature destination and potentially attract further development. Pat Shannon, who served

as interim president of the Friends of Gilliam County through Oktoberfest, said plans are still preliminary, and the group is fleshing out ideas for what the building would look like, and what it needs.

Cost estimates ranged anywhere from \$300,000 to \$2 million, he said. But nothing is set in stone, Shannon said.

"The initial idea is it would be a venue in this town that could pull people from the region as far as The Dalles and Pendleton," he said. "It's kind of being designed with an old, rustic look.

If all goes smoothly, McGuire said he could envision breaking ground as early as next year.

"People are looking for a new destination with character," he said. "I want this to stick out for the gorge to see."

on Tuesday, Ward was originally set to retire in February 2017 but city councilors had expressed a desire for Pelleberg to assume the role of city manager on March 1, 2016.

The plan proposed that Ward stay on as city manager until March 1, then serve in a transitional capacity from March 1 to July 1, at which time his contract would be terminated "with buy-out provisions."

Under the plan Pelleberg would continue to serve as public works director in addition to becoming city while finance manager, director Melissa Ince would become deputy city manager in addition to her finance duties and public works supervisor Jason Barron would assume some additional responsibilities in the public works department. Councilor Mary Dedrick

voted in opposition of the plan and councilor Sharon Farnsworth was absent. Councilors Mel Ray, George Fenton, David Lougee and Roak Ten Eyck voted in favor.

Ward declined comment after the meeting.


