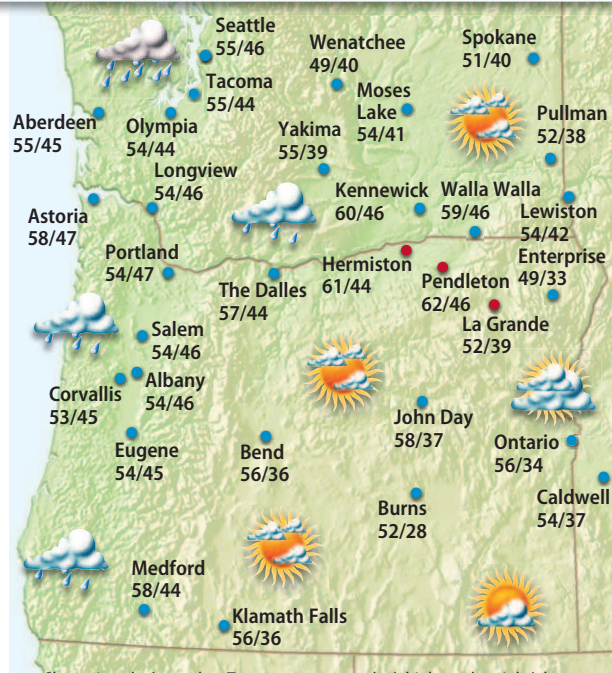

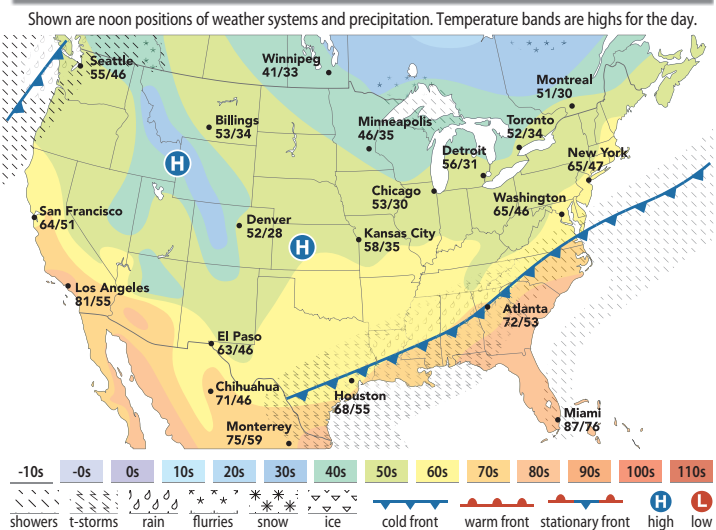

Wolf kills cow in first southern Oregon attack

SALEM (AP) — Oregon wildlife officials say a wolf attacked three cattle last weekend, killing one and wounding two others.

The Statesman Journal reports that the Klamath County incident was the first example of a wolf attacking a domestic animal in southern Oregon and the most western case since the animals were reintroduced to Idaho in 1996.

Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife spokeswoman Michelle Dennehy says the agency will work with its federal counterpart to develop non-lethal measures to help prevent future attacks.

Wolves are protected by the Endangered Species Act in the western two-thirds of Oregon. The livestock were attacked by a male wolf tagged as OR25. The wolf left the Imnaha Pack in March and eventually settled northeast of Chiloquin.

OHSU loans \$50M to Moda Health

PORTLAND (AP) — Oregon Health and Science University has pumped \$50 million into the struggling insurer Moda Health Plan Inc.

The Oregonian reports it's the largest such transaction in OHSU's history.

OHSU officials say they granted the unsecured loan in part because Moda stepped forward to take on people gaining access to insurance under President Barack Obama's health care law. But those patients turned out to be much costlier than expected.

OHSU, which is funded in part with public money, wants to be a dominant health care provider in Oregon. But it lacks an affiliated insurance plan that competitors Kaiser Permanente and Providence have.

For accounting purposes, OHSU now considers the loan work \$33.5 million.

Moda officials say their company is in no financial jeopardy and insist they'll repay the debt.

Manhattan Project National Park signing Tuesday

RICHLAND, Wash. (AP) — A meeting on the new Manhattan Project National Historical Park is scheduled in Kennewick next Thursday.

Federal officials on Tuesday will have a signing ceremony in Washington, D.C., to establish the new national park, which will include Hanford's historic B Reactor.

The Tri-City Herald says the park will also include Manhattan Project facilities at Los Alamos, New Mexico, and Oak Ridge, Tennessee.

The Manhattan Project National Historical Park will be part of a small percentage of national parks focusing on science and technology.

Hanford for decades made plutonium for nuclear weapons, including the atomic bomb dropped on Nagasaki, Japan, during World War II.

Malheur County approves permit for Vale fly farm

VALE (AP) — Malheur County Court has upheld the approval of a conditional-use permit for a fly farm despite neighbors' pleas for the operation to buzz off.

The Argus Observer

reports that the court upheld the permit approval at its Wednesday session after a lengthy hearing. The permit was initially approved by the Malheur County Planning Commission on Sept. 24.

Fly Farm Products owner Skip Cockerum, of Ontario, says his company produces fish bait and feed for caged or wild birds. He says the size of his property is large enough for the small-scale project which including bringing in fresh cow manure for his livestock to eat.

Two more sue Chipotle after getting sick

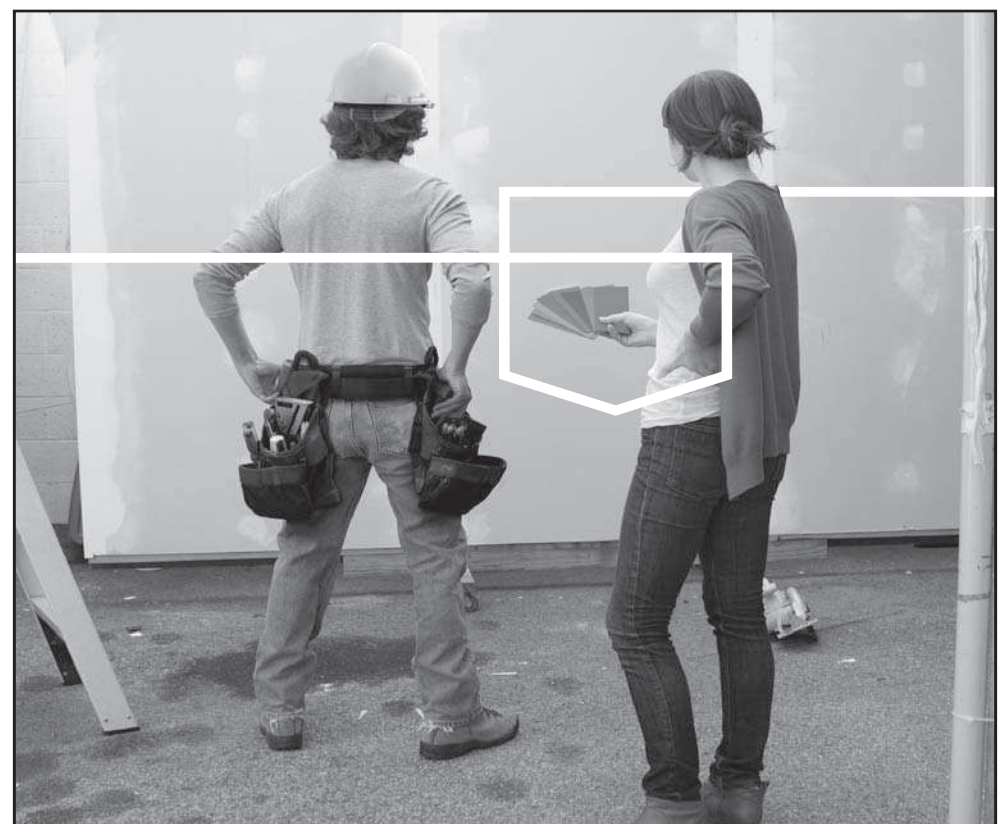
SEATTLE (AP) — A second Washington woman and an Oregon man who contracted E. coli after eating at a Chipotle franchise are suing the Mexican restaurant chain.

Jessica Ellis of Mount Vernon, Washington and Chris Collins of Lake Oswego, Oregon, filed federal lawsuits on Friday.

Health officials in Washington and Oregon say more than three dozen people have gotten sick with E. coli in an outbreak linked to Chipotle restaurants in the two states. More than 40 Chipotle restaurants remain closed in Washington state and the Portland area while authorities search for the cause.
