Crews clean off Seattle gum wall

SEATTLE — A piece of Seattle history is coming down — or rather, 1 million little pieces.

Crews are cleaning the city's famed "gum wall" near Pike Place Market, where tourists and locals have been sticking their used chewing gum for the past 20 years.

The wall is plastered with wads of gum in a kaleidoscope of colors, some stretched and pinched into messages, hearts and other designs. People also have used the gooey gobs to paste up pictures, business cards and other mementos.

On Tuesday, powerful steam cleaners were melting it all off.

Emily Crawford, a Pike Place Market spokeswoman, said that following a busy summer season, market leaders decided now was as good a time as any to wipe the wall clean. But they expect people will start leaving gum on the space again soon.

"It's an icon. It's history," said onlooker Zoe Freeman, who works near Pike Place. "The market is famous for the gum wall. But it also draws rats.

Pike Place Market hired contractor, Cascadian Building Maintenance, to take on the cleaning. They chose steam over pressure washing to conserve the historic market's brick walls. The blasts of moist air against a mass of dried gum sent a fruity, sweet smell though the alley.

citizens of Seattle don't hate me for removing the gum wall," said Kelly Foster, the contractor's general manager.

People first began smooshing their gum to the wall while waiting for shows at the nearby Market Theater.

Since then, the "gum wall" has expanded beyond one wall and onto other walls of an alley, pipes and even the theater's box office window.

Crawford said cleaning crew will collect and weigh the gum each day it is removed. The cleaning is expected to take three days.

By Crawford's rough calculation, there are about 2,200 pounds of gum on the walls.

"We'll find out at the end of the week how right my guesstimate really is," she

Armed deputy patrolling Umpqua following shooting

PORTLAND (AP) — An armed sheriff's deputy has started patrolling an Oregon college where a gunman killed nine people and himself last month.

Douglas County deputy Scott Batsch began patrols Monday at Umpqua Community College. When a shooter attacked the Roseburg campus Oct. 1, it had one guard armed only with pepper spray.

Batsch is a recently retired deputy with experience as a school resource officer, patrolman and detective. Umpqua's \$30,000 contract with Douglas County will pay for him to be on campus seven hours a day, five days a week through June 30, The Oregonian reported. He will have a car on campus but mostly will patrol on foot.

Oregon law community colleges can't employ armed officers, but they can contract with police agencies for the service.

"Obviously the school has been through a lot and the community has been through a lot, and having that uniformed presence will make everyone involved feel a little bit better going forward," said Cpl. Dwes Hutson, the sheriff's department spokesman.

Students protested at Portland State University and the University of Oregon when administrators decided to arm their

public information officer officers. But Anne Marie Levis, Umpqua Community College public information officer, expects no oppo-sition on the Roseburg

campus. "After a tragedy like this, people have a different perspective," Levis said. "We've had other armed police officers on campus, so it's one of those things that just gives people peace of mind, at this point."

Oregon State Police troopers and other armed officers have patrolled Umpqua's campus at times since the shootings, Levis said.

County Commissioner Tim Freeman said the college requested the contract, which he and the other two commissioners approved.

"It's a large campus, so it's hard to say that having one armed officer, depending on the situation, could have been effective," Freeman said. "I don't want to give any false illusions about how much or how little it'll make things better."

Chipotle reopening Northwest restaurants after E. coli outbreak

SEATTLE (AP) — Chipotle said Tuesday that it is reopening the 43 Pacific Northwest restaurants it closed amid an E. coli outbreak after tests at the Mexican food chain came back negative for the bacteria.

Health officials have not found a cause of the outbreak that started last month but concluded there is no ongoing risk of contracting the illness that has sickened about 40

Chipotle will reopen the restaurants in Washington state and Oregon in the coming days after giving them a deep cleaning and ordering a fresh supply of ingredients, the company said. It also said it is testing the new food prior to restocking and is instituting additional safety procedures and audits in all of its 2,000 restaurants to ensure robust food safety standards.

Chipotle Chairman Steve Ells apologized to those affected by the outbreak.

"The safety of our customers and integrity of our food supply has always been our highest priority," he said in a statement. "If there are any opportunities for us to do better in any facet of our sourcing or food

handling — from the farms to our restaurants — we will find them."

The outbreak was traced to 11 Chipotle restaurants in Oregon and Washington, but the company closed 43 locations in its Seattle and Portland markets as a precaution. It said it conducted additional sanitization measures in its restaurants nationwide and confirmed that none of its workers had E. coli.

Dr. Scott Lindquist, Washington's state epidemiologist, had said he expected the restaurants to reopen by Wednesday or Thursday.

The most recent person sickened

by *E. coli* reported eating at Chipotle on Oct. 24. People typically become sick about three to four days after exposure, but it can take as long as

The bacteria are associated with animal waste and can be spread through contaminated water or improperly cured compost. Symptoms include diarrhea, abdominal cramps, nausea and vomiting.

Foodborne illnesses are not easy to track to the source of the outbreak, said Jonathan Modie, a spokesman for the Oregon Health

"Finding the source of the outbreak is often like finding a needle in the haystack," Modie said
