### Warriors match fastest start ever

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) - Stephen Curry scored 28 points

and Andre Iguodala added 20 as the Golden State Warriors

matched a franchise record for most wins to start a season with a 100-84 victory over the Memphis Grizzlies on Wednesday night.

Harrison Barnes added 19 points for Golden State, which won its ninth straight to open the season. Curry's was 9 of 21 from the field, but only 3 of 10 from outside the arc. The Warriors finished shooting 41 percent from 3-point range, 11 of 27.

Marc Gasol had 26 points, Zach Randolph added 19 and Tony Allen finished with 15 as the Grizzlies lost their fourth straight.

#### **Stanford starts** campaigning for **McCaffrey**

A breakout season has prompted Stanford to start a Heisman Trophy campaign for running back Christian McCaffrey.

Cardinal coach David Shaw initially

downplayed the idea but now says the timing is right. McCaffrey leads the nation with 2,174 all-purpose yards, putting

him on pace to break the collegiate record of 3,250 yards by Barry Sanders in 11 games in 1988. Sanders, whose son by the same name plays with McCaffrey, won the Heisman that season.

McCaffrey has 1,205 yards rushing, 325 receiving, 605 on kick returns and 37 on punt returns.

# Former Trail Blazer leads Spurs to win

PORTLAND - LaMarcus Aldridge scored 23 points in his return to Portland, leading the San Antonio Spurs to a 113-101 victory over the Trail Blazers on Wednesday night.

Aldridge, who played nine seasons in Portland before leaving as a free agent this summer, added six rebounds. Kawhi Leonard finished with 20 points for the Spurs, who won



their third straight. Damian Lillard led the Blazers with 22 points, including five 3-pointers, and nine assists. Portland has lost three straight. The game marked Aldridge's first appearance in Portland since he signed a four-year deal worth \$80 million with San Antonio in July.

So many Syracuse players fouled out that the officials let some of the players back into the game so the Nationals could keep five men on the court.
