at their own 32, it took the Mustangs just seven runs to end the first streak. Following a three-and-out and a punt by Reedsport, it took just seven more runs to end the second.

Both drives were typical of what would transpire for the rest of the first half as Putman and C.J. Kindle took turns running through gaping holes in the line and punishing the second-level defenders they found on the other side.

"They punched us in the mouth and put us up on the ropes and just kept punching," said Reedsport coach Shane Nelson. "We're not big but we've been a very physical team all year, and we just couldn't match that level. Which is unfortunate, but it is what it is."

Heppner finished with 426 yards of total offense with 373 rushing vards. The Mustangs scored on their first six drives of the first half before running out the clock to take a 46-0

Ducks keep title hopes alive

STANFORD, Calif. — Vernon Adams had Oregon's big-play offense clicking. Stanford was able to grind it out behind Kevin Hogan and Christian McCaffrey.

When it came down to it, two botched snaps and a failed 2-point conversion spoiled the Cardinal's playoff hopes and kept the Ducks alive in the Pac-12 race.

Adams threw for 205 yards and two touchdowns and Oregon used its quick-strike offense and the late 2-point stop to beat No. 7 Stanford 38-36 victory Saturday night.

"We kept fighting out there," Adams said. "It was a great team win. It shows how good we can be."

In a game dominated by offenses that combined for more than 900 yards, it was a defensive stop on the 2-point attempt with 10 seconds left that sealed the win for Oregon (7-3, 5-2 Pac-12) and kept the Ducks' hopes for a conference title alive.

After Hogan lost two fumbles on snaps in the fourth quarter, Stanford (8-2, 7-1, No. 7 CFP) tied it on Hogan's 4-yard touchdown pass to Greg Taboada. Needing a 2-point conversion to tie it, Hogan tried to find tight end Austin Hooper over the middle against the blitz. But linebacker Joe Walker got a finger on the
