COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) — Texas A&M has lost its top two quarter-

backs after Kyler Murray left the team and was granted a release to transfer Thursday.

The highly touted freshman followed Kyle Allen in leaving the team. Allen was granted his release last Thursday.

The move leaves the Aggies in a difficult predicament for the Music City Bowl against Louisville on Dec. 30. Texas A&M has just one scholarship quarterback on its roster in Jake Hubenak, a junior college transfer from Blinn College who played sparingly this season.

It's unclear what caused the pair to leave the team, but the moves raise questions about whether there are problems between the coaching staff and the players.

The 2015 football season was special one for the Heppner Mustangs

They cruised through the ninegame regular season with relative ease, and then rolled through the playoffs in similar fashion on their way to winning the Class 2A state title — the ultimate team honor.

On Thursday, the players involved were honored on an individual scale, as Heppner placed 12 players on the first team all-state


And with the awards and trophies all handed out, the book officially closes on the prep football career of Collins and his classmates, which is something that Collins said went by too fast.

Perry scored two near falls in the second round — one of three points and the other of two — before scoring a reversal, a two-point near fall and
