Snoqualmie Tribe sues city, mayor over utility agreement

SEATTLE — The Snoqualmie Indian Tribe has filed a federal lawsuit claiming racial discrimination is behind a decision by the city of Snoqualmie, its mayor and council to end utility services for the tribe’s casino.

The suit filed in U.S. District Court in Seattle seeks an injunction and claims that without sewer services, the casino would have to close and that would threaten the tribe’s ability to offer governmental programs and services.

The casino hosts about 6,000 visitors each day and the tribe pays almost \$500,000 each year for sewer services, the lawsuit said. The City Council recently decided to end its agreement to provide sewer utility services. The lawsuit claims the city is trying to “choke out the tribe on the basis of race.”

“The tribe filed this action to protect its economic engine and to prevent a shut down that would harm tribal members and the lives of the 1,200 employees who work at the casino,” the tribe’s lawyer, Rob Roy Smith said in an email.

Tribal members have evidence of “racial intent,”

Smith said, noting the city has “relentlessly campaigned against the tribe on cultural resource issues” and “singled the tribe out for unfair treatment.”

The lawsuit asks the judge to issue an injunction to prevent the city from taking any steps to terminate or suspend sewer services.

Messages left with Bob Sterbank and Michael Walter, the lawyers listed as representing the city in the case, were not immediately returned.

The utility services agreement was set up in 2004 and the tribe has paid every bill on time since the casino opened in 2008, Smith said.

In October, the city informed the tribe that it intends to terminate sewer services to the casino by next November, the complaint said.

Tribal officials said they tried to negotiate an agreement but the city sent a letter to the U.S. Bureau of Indian Affairs stating it wanted to end the business relationship with the tribe.

“The city has also stated, in writing, that they will oppose the tribe’s efforts to connect to another municipality’s sewer system or to develop the tribe’s own wastewater treatment facility,” Smith said.

FDA proposes ban on indoor tanning for minors

WASHINGTON — Anyone under the age of 18 would be barred from using indoor tanning equipment, under a federal proposal to help reduce skin cancer linked to the devices.

The Food and Drug Administration also wants to require tanning bed users to sign consent forms acknowledging the risks of the radiation-emitting devices. Tanning salons and other businesses would have to collect the forms from customers before their first tanning session and every six months thereafter.

Friday’s announcement follows years of prodding by dermatologists and medical groups for bolder action on indoor tanning, citing rising rates of skin cancer among teens and people in their 20s, particularly women. The leading professional group for skin specialists applauded the news.

“Indoor tanning is the cigarette of this generation, it is so clearly carcinogenic,” said Dr. Mark Lebwohl, president of the American Academy of Dermatology. “It is long overdue and a historic victory in our fight to eradicate skin cancer that the FDA has come out with a proposal to restrict indoor tanning.”

Twenty three states already have laws banning minors from using indoor tanning equipment.

Last year the FDA required tanning beds and sun lamps to carry new warnings advising that they should not be used by anyone under age 18. The FDA has regulated tanning machines for over 30 years, but had previously taken little action to restrict their use.

“Despite available information about its adverse effects, many high schoolers continue to use indoor tanning devices,” the FDA’s Dr. Vasum Peiris told reporters. “Now we’re taking further steps.”

The FDA would be able to seize machines and fine businesses that don’t follow the rules, once finalized, according to Peiris, who is a chief medical officer in the agency’s device center.

The Indoor Tanning Association said decisions about tanning should be left to parents, not the government.

The Chrysler left the road and struck a large sign, then rolled to a stop on its top.

The passenger may have broken one hand in the crash and suffered cuts to both, state police reported.

People stopped to lend aid and told the trooper that arrived the driver was intoxicated. The trooper talked to Strain and noted he was impaired. Strain also told the trooper, according to state police, he consumed alcohol and was 20.

Troopers arrested him and took him to the Milton-Freewater Police Department, where his blood alcohol level was .19 percent — more than twice the legal limit of .08 percent.
