Riverhawks come from behind to put away Bulldogs

THE DALLES — The Hermiston boys basketball team led at the end of the first three quarters but couldn’t hold on down the stretch against The Dalles on Friday in Columbia River Conference play.

The Riverhawks scored 23 points in the fourth quarter to come from behind and beat the Bulldogs 59-53 in a game that got heated.

points in the third quarter, but didn’t do itself any favors with 8-of-28 free throw shooting in the game.

The Dalles (5-13, 2-2), on the other hand, went 18 for 22 at the charity stripe.

Dakota Murr led the game with 32 points for the Riverhawks and John Miller added 11. Murr’s shot at the buzzer in the third quarter capped a 13-5 run in the frame.

Chance Flores paced the Bulldogs with 18

points and Austin Naillon added 12.

Hermiston will look to snap a three-game skid on Tuesday when it hosts Hood River at 7 p.m.

HOOD RIVER — The Pendleton girls basketball team snapped a three-game losing streak on Friday with a runaway win over Hood River 66-45 in Columbia River Conference play.

Hailey Greb led the way with 13 points, five assists and five steals as Pendleton (7-12, 2-2 CRC) pulled into a tie for second place with The Dalles, which lost to Hermiston.

Cece Hoffman added 12 points, four assists and four steals for Pendleton, which led 32-22 at halftime and kept the lead at double digits most of the way.

Lauren Orr led Hood River (3-14, 0-4) with 16 points.

The Buckaroos were again without post Maureen Davies as she continues to recover from a

concussion sustained on Jan. 26 in a loss to La Grande.

Coach Michelle Gomez said the team is hopeful to get her back for next week’s home showdown with The Dalles, which boasts a tall lineup that gave Pendleton trouble the last time out.

“Hopefully we’ll get her back by then,” she said. “It’s still pretty early, I think, but we’ll see.”

Weisner leads Beavers over Huskies

SEATTLE — Senior Jamie Weisner scored 21 points to lead No. 9 Oregon State to its ninth straight win, 61-53 over No. 24 Washington on Friday night.

Sydney Weise added 12 points and Ruth Hamblin grabbed nine rebounds and blocked three shots for Oregon State (19-3, 10-1 Pac 12), which hasn’t lost since Jan. 4 at UCLA.

Washington (16-6, 7-4) wasn’t able to overcome a 14-point halftime deficit and lost its third home game of the season - all against ranked opponents.

Oregon State built a big lead in the second quarter, turning a four-point advantage into 14 at intermission. The Beavers maintained their double-digit lead throughout the second half despite a strong push from the Huskies.

The conference’s leading scorer, Kelsey Plum, recovered from a tough first half. The Washington guard finished with 30 points on 10-of-22 shooting. Plum was 3 of 11 at halftime.

Washington fell behind in large part thanks to a horrendous second-quarter performance from the field. The Huskies shot 2 of 15, managing one 3-pointer and two free throws.

They made a push in the fourth quarter and cut the deficit to 10. With a chance to cut it to single digits for the first time since the first half, Talia Walton rebounded her own miss. But Weisner came away with a steal and drove down the court for a fast-break layup.

Oregon State didn’t allow the Huskies to get that close again until the game was decided late in the fourth.

OREGON 73, WASHINGTON STATE 48

PULLMAN, Wash. — Jillian Alleyne had 25 points on 10-of-13 shooting and 14 rebounds to tie the school record with her 88th career double-double and Oregon used a dominating start to defeat Washington State 73-48 on Friday night.

Alleyne, the Pac-12 career leader in double-doubles, tied Bev Smith’s record set before the NCAA sponsored women’s basketball.

Alleyne made all seven of her shots and Jordan Loera made all three of her 3-point attempts in the first half as Oregon made 15 of 21 shots and raced to a 39-14 lead at the break. The Cougars missed all nine of their 3-point attempts and shot just 25 percent with 12 turnovers.

WSU had a 7-0 run late in the third quarter that helped cut a 29-point deficit to 20, 57-37. Oregon hit five 3s in the quarter with Maite Cazorla making all four of her attempts on her way to

15 points.

Oregon (16-6, 5-6) made 12 of 20 behind the arc and shot 59.5 percent overall.

Borislava Hristova led the Cougars (12-10, 3-8), who have lost five straight, with 19 points. WSU went 3 for 22 on 3-pointers and shot 31 percent.

EASTERN OREGON 84, MULTNOMAH 36

LA GRANDE — The Eastern Oregon Mountaineers dominated the Multnomah Lions from start to finish on Friday evening to earn to earn the teams’ 13th win in conference play.

The Mountaineers (17-8, 13-3 CCC) ran away with an early 21-3 after one quarter and then extended that to a 45-12 lead at the break. The Mountaineers held Multnomah (4-19, 2-13) to a mere 5-31 shooting (16 percent) in the half, while shooting 14-38 (36 percent) themselves.

The second half was just as easy for EOU, as the team shot 15-30 (50 percent) and scored 39 points to breeze to the win, while Multnomah shot 10-31 (32 percent) in the second half.

Jordan Klebaum led a trio of EOU scorers into double-digits with 16 points and four made 3-pointers, while Darian Gasselting netted 13 points on 5-10 shooting and Nikki Osborne finished with 11 points and added 14 rebounds.

The Mountaineers cleaned up the battle of

the boards on Friday, out-rebounding the Lions 62-28 for its second-largest rebound margin of the season.

Eastern Oregon hits the court again today at home against Warner Pacific for a 5:30 p.m. tip-off.

EASTERN OREGON 106, MULTNOMAH 74

LA GRANDE — The Eastern Oregon Mountaineers have controlled many games this season with its potent outside shot, but on Friday night it leaned on the muscle of its inside game behind senior center Calvin Johanson to dispose of the Multnomah Lions.

Johanson posted a 26 point performance on 8-11 shooting and nailed 10-12 free throws to help lead the Mountaineers (14-12, 9-7 CCC) to a season-best 68 points in the paint in the game.

Aside from Johanson, Case Rada netted 17 points on 5-11 shooting, Travis Meeker had 15 points, Christian Parrott had 16 points, and Trell Washington added a double-double with 10 points and 11 rebounds.

As a team, Eastern Oregon out-shot Multnomah (4-19, 1-14) 56 percent (42-74) to 35 percent (27-76) and had a whopping 28 total assists to the Lions’ eight.

The first half was an easy one for the Mountaineers, as they hit the break with a 52-21 lead over the Lions. In the half, EOU held the Lions to 9-35 shooting (25 percent) and forced 10 turnovers, while they netted 20-34 shot attempts (58 percent) and had 13 assists to just seven turnovers.

The second half was much of the same for the Mountaineers, shooting 55 percent from the floor and finishing with a 15-3 assist-to-turnover ratio. Multnomah caught fire from behind the 3-point arch in the half as well, hitting 10-19 attempts to help boost the team to a 52-point half.
