Oregon beats UCLA to clinch share of Pac-12 title

LOS ANGELES — Tyler Dorsey scored 20 points and No. 9 Oregon rallied in the second half to beat UCLA 76-68 on Wednesday night, giving the Ducks at least a share of the Pac-12 title for the first time since 2002.

Dillon Brooks added 15 points, and Elgin Cook had 14 points, making all six of his free throws for the Ducks (24-6, 13-4 Pac-12), who won their fourth in a row and 10th in 12 games. Dorsey had a team-high nine rebounds, helping the Ducks control the boards, 40-28.

Isaac Hamilton scored 19 points, Tony Parker added 18, and Bryce Alford 16 points for the Bruins (15-15, 6-11). They have lost three straight and six of eight with one game remaining in the regular season.

After leading by 11 points in the first half, the Bruins made a last-gasp attempt to win. Alford, who was 6 of 14 shooting, hit consecutive 3-pointers that got them to 71-68 with 59 seconds left.

After a timeout, the Ducks passed the ball around before Brooks coolly sank a 3-pointer for a 74-68 lead. Hamilton missed a layup and Alford snagged the offensive rebound before turning the ball over with 11 seconds left.



UCLA led by seven points early in the second half before the Ducks scored nine straight to take a 50-48 lead. The Bruins tied it four more times, but never regained the lead.

Alford's 3-pointer put UCLA back in front 23-21 and launched an 18-12 run that ended the half with the Bruins leading 38-33. Alford and Hamilton each had six points in the spurt, with three other players scoring, too.

Oregon: The Ducks clinched the No. 1 seed for the Pac-12 tourney in Las Vegas. ... F Chris Boucher had three blocked shots to break the single-season school record with 96. ... The Ducks are 15-0 when holding opponents under 70 points.

UCLA: Hamilton has scored in double figures for 26 straight games. He's the only Pac-12 player in double figures in each of his team's league games this season.

Nikola Jovanovic had 10 points and eight rebounds for USC, which won for only the second time in seven games and improved to 16-1 at home.

California on Saturday. Southern

reached the 20-win mark for the first since 2008-09.

Gary Payton II had 19 points, seven rebounds and five assists to lead Oregon State (17-11, 8-9), which dropped to eighth place in conference with one league game left. Stephen Thompson Jr. added 17 for the Beavers, who fell to 1-7 in conference road games.

The Trojans ran off a season-high 56 points in the first half, making 21 of 34 (62 percent) from the field, including 8 of 11 from 3-point range. USC finished off the period with an 18-4 spurt for a 56-33 halftime lead.

Oregon State: Coach Wayne Tinkle is only the second coach in school history to win 17 games in his first two years in charge. Bob Hager was the first, back in 1923 (19-7) and 1924 (20-5). Gary Payton II came into the game as the only player in the country averaging 15.5 points, 7.5 rebounds, 5.0 assists and 2.5 assists.

Southern California: The Trojans have won 10 of their last 12 home games against the Beavers. ... The Trojans' last five losses were by an average of 13.0 points per game, with the last two by 20 (at Stanford) and 22 (at California) last weekend.

Three different Falcons — Robertson (2), Matt Niebergall and Joe Boyd — each hit 3-pointers to grab a slice of the momentum, but Hermiston kept the Falcons at arm's length with aggressive drives and made free throws.

La Salle got as close as seven in the final stanza on Andrew Lam's basket, but the lead was quickly back to 12.


